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
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PREFACE

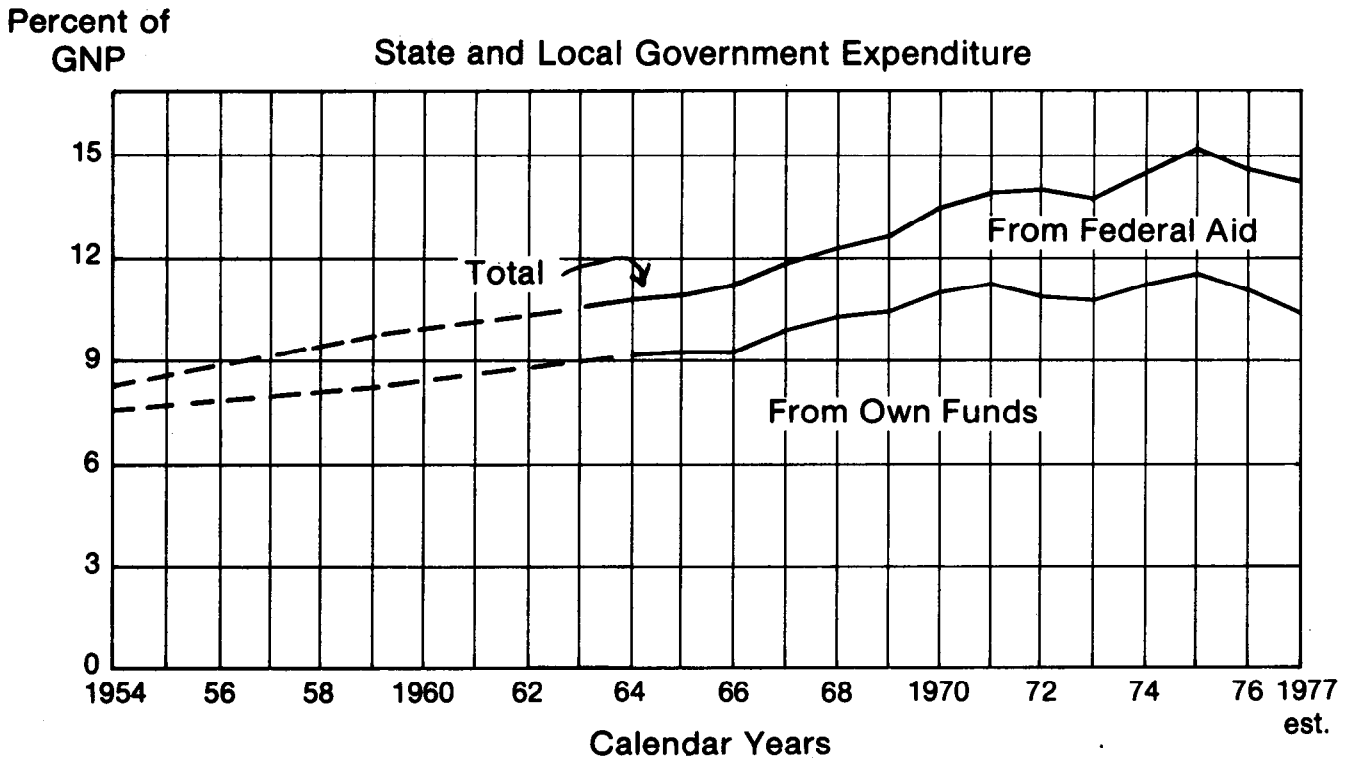
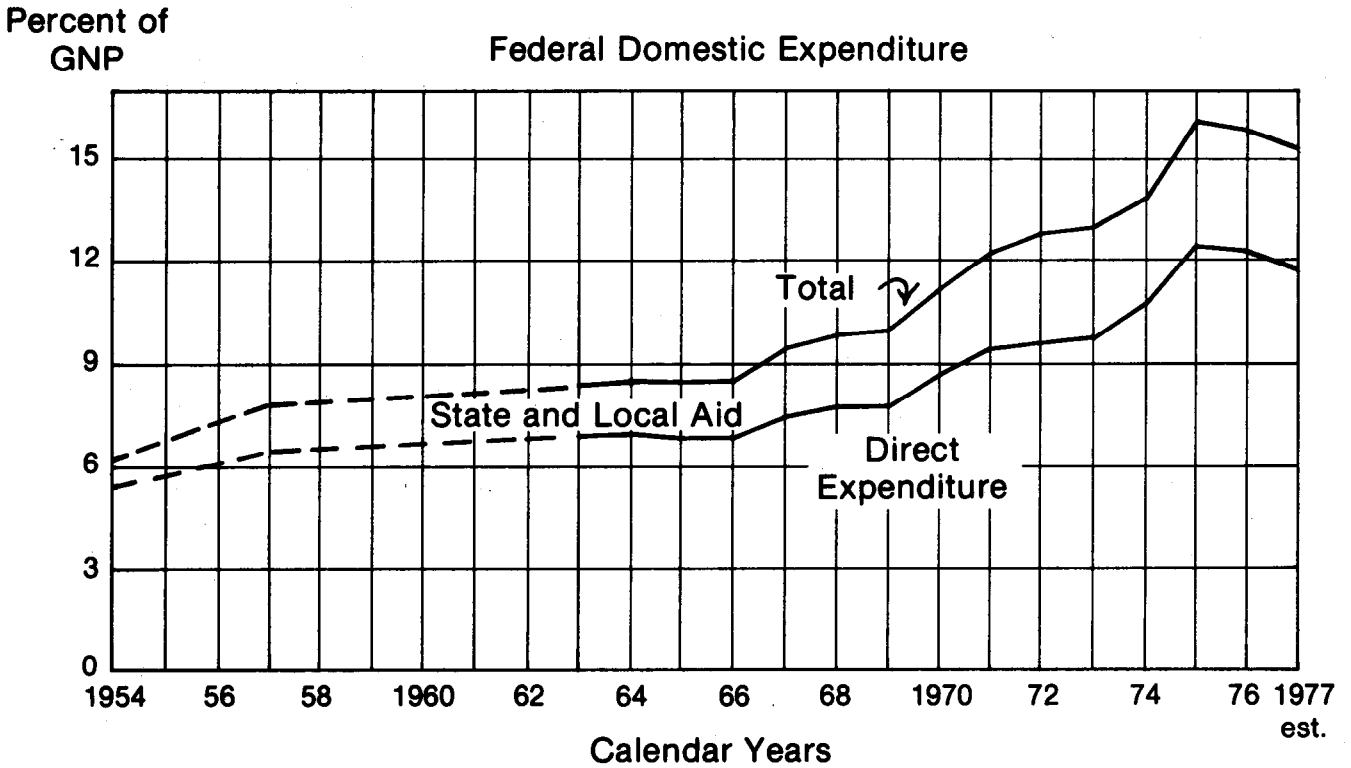

REPORT HIGHLIGHTS

Public Sector Slowdown

The growth in the public sector is no longer outstripping that of the rest of the economy. Government expenditures hit their peak in calendar 1975—35 percent of gross national product—then fell to 34 percent in 1976 and to an estimated 32.8 percent for 1977 (Table 1).

Both economic and fiscal factors are responsible for this rather significant decline. Propelled by the recovery surge, the private sector has grown at a faster clip than usual. Restrained by the spirit of fiscal austerity, government spending has grown at a somewhat slower pace than usual.

Massive Increase in Federal Aid

There was nothing slow about one major sector of public spending—federal aid flows to states and localities. Between 1976 and 1977, federal aid to states and localities jumped from \$59.0 billion to an estimated \$72.4 billion.

This increase alone—\$13.4 billion—is greater than total federal aid to states and localities in 1965 (Table 3).

Most of this increase can be attributed to hikes in five major program areas:

Countercyclical Programs	\$4.4 billion
Sewage Treatment Construction	2.0 billion
Medicaid	1.7 billion
Income Security Programs	2.1 billion
Community Development Block Grants	1.3 billion

An inevitable concomitant of the large growth in federal aid is a growing dependency of state and local governments on federal aid flows—rising from 10 percent of total state-local expenditures in 1950 to an estimated 27 percent by 1977.

Since the early 1960's, federal aid has been growing at a faster rate than state and local revenue from own sources:

Growing Big City Dependency on Federal Aid

The federal government has rather suddenly developed at least one significant element of an urban policy—a willingness to underwrite, directly, a large share of the expenditures of cities in general and of the “sick” central cities in particular. Three facts underscore this recent dramatic development:

- Direct federal aid to the nation's big cities has risen more than tenfold over the last 11 years—from \$4 billion in 1967 to an estimated \$5.4 billion for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1974 (Table 4A).
- For each dollar that the large cities raised from their own sources in 1967, they received about 9 cents directly from the federal government; for each dollar they will raise in fiscal 1978 it is estimated that they will receive about 50 cents directly from Washington (Table 4A).
- By 1976, the big cities were receiving on average more aid from the federal government than from their states—\$102 per capita in federal aid to \$89 per capita in state aid (Table 4A).

This significant growth in big city dependency on direct federal aid flows can be traced largely to four major developments:

1. President Johnson's war on poverty programs in the sixties
2. Passage of general revenue sharing in 1972
3. The enactment of the community development program in 1974
4. The development of the temporary economic “stimulus package” in

1976-1977 which helped cities by providing countercyclical revenue sharing funds, expanding the CETA jobs program, and accelerating local public works activity.

Great Disparities in State Public Welfare Burdens

Despite the recent federal “takeover” of certain categories of public welfare, there still remain great disparities in state public welfare loads. In 1975, the most heavily burdened states—Massachusetts, Michigan, California, Rhode Island, and New York—carried anywhere from four to six times the welfare load of those of the least burdened states—South Carolina, North Dakota, Texas, Wyoming, and Florida (Table 23).

When the trends in state welfare burdens are traced over time, they reveal that most of the significant increases in public welfare burdens have taken place in the New England, Midwest, and Great Lakes regions. California and Hawaii stand out as the major exceptions to this “Frostbelt” development (Table 23).

Federal and State Payroll Trends

When the federal government decides to do something more on the domestic front, it usually accomplishes that objective by increasing its aid flows in order to buy additional services from state and local employees. This fiscal fact of intergovernmental life goes a long way in explaining both the significant “real” growth in the number of state and local employees and the slight decline in the “real” size of the federal establishment. For example, between

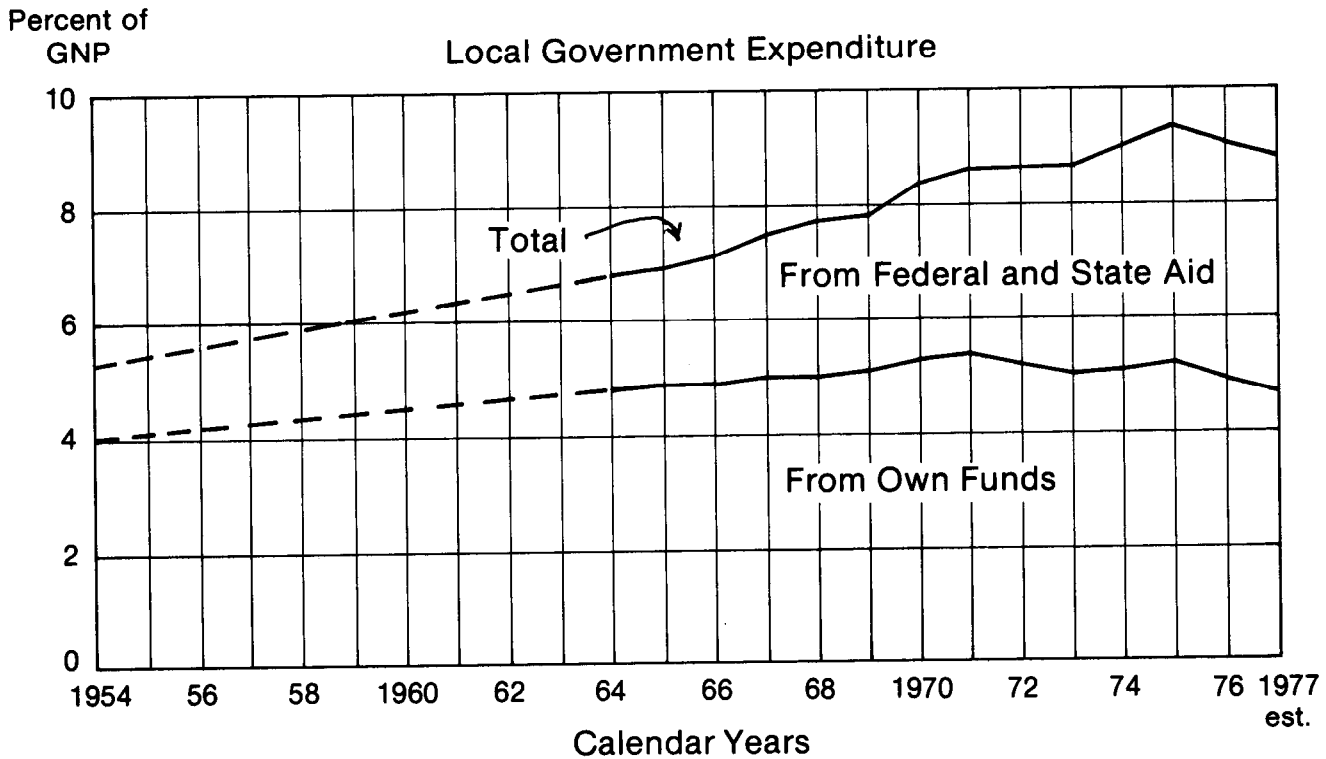
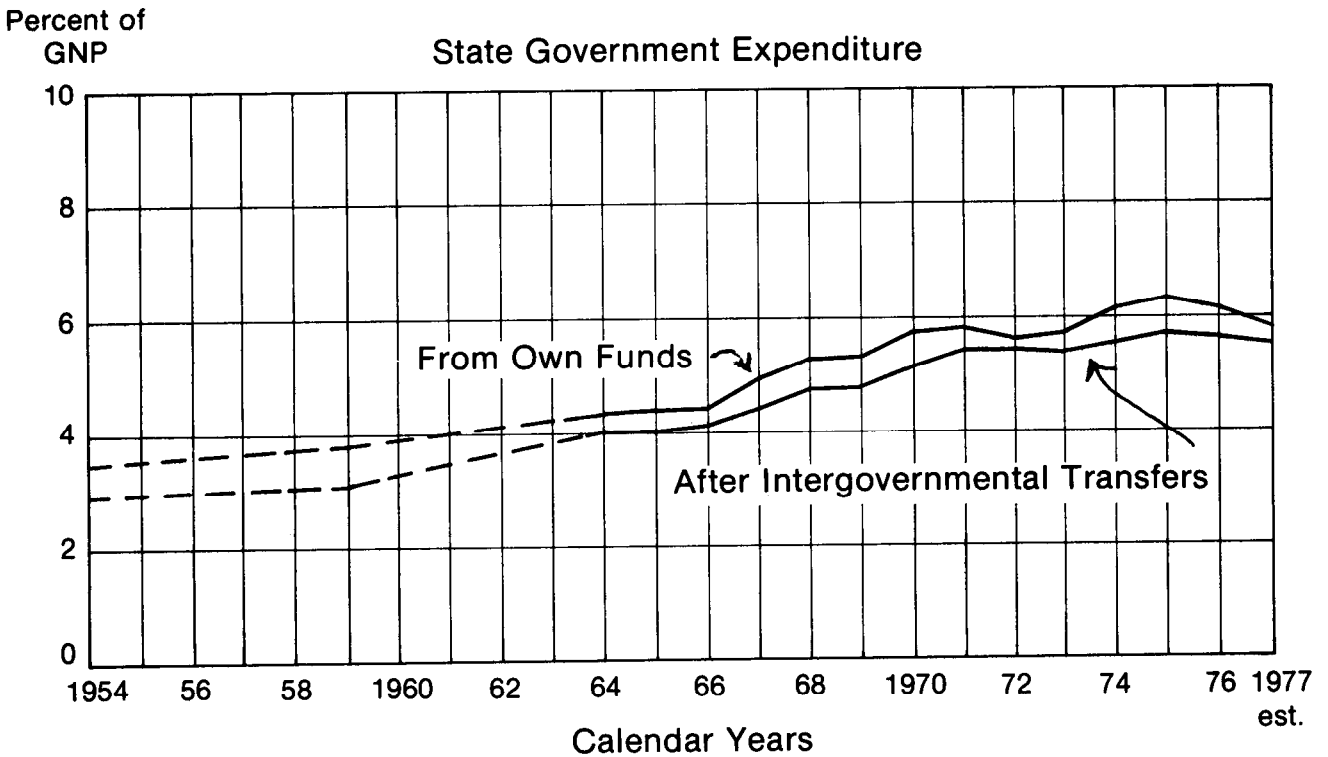
1957 and 1976, the number of state-local employees per 10,000 population rose from 281 to 475 while the federal figure dropped from 131 to 128 employees per 10,000 population (Table 43). To put it another way, state and local employment chalked up a "real" gain of 69 percent while federal employment experienced a 2 percent decline.

It should be noted that Tables 43, 44, and 45 fairly bristle with interesting personnel data:

- Most of the jurisdictions registering the largest "real" employment gains between 1957 and 1976 are to be found along or near the Atlantic Coast—Delaware, 93.6%; Maryland, 95.8%; District of Columbia, 179.8%; Virginia, 95.3%; West Virginia, 110.6%; North Carolina, 92.6%; South Carolina, 89.0%; and Georgia, 94.9% (Table 43).

- Average annual earnings for full-time state and local employees rose from \$4,032 in 1957 to \$12,252 in 1976. The 1976 pay range among the states was great—from \$8,724 in Mississippi to \$19,680 in Alaska (Table 44).
- State and local payroll costs on average rose from 5.6 percent of personal income in 1957 to 9.2 in 1972. By 1976 they had slipped back slightly to 9 percent of personal income (Table 45).
- As is to be expected, the national picture masks significant interstate differences—the payroll burden amounted to 7 percent of personal income in Connecticut and 10.2 percent for neighboring New York State; 8.2 percent in Oklahoma and Texas, and 11.4 percent for neighboring New Mexico (Table 45).

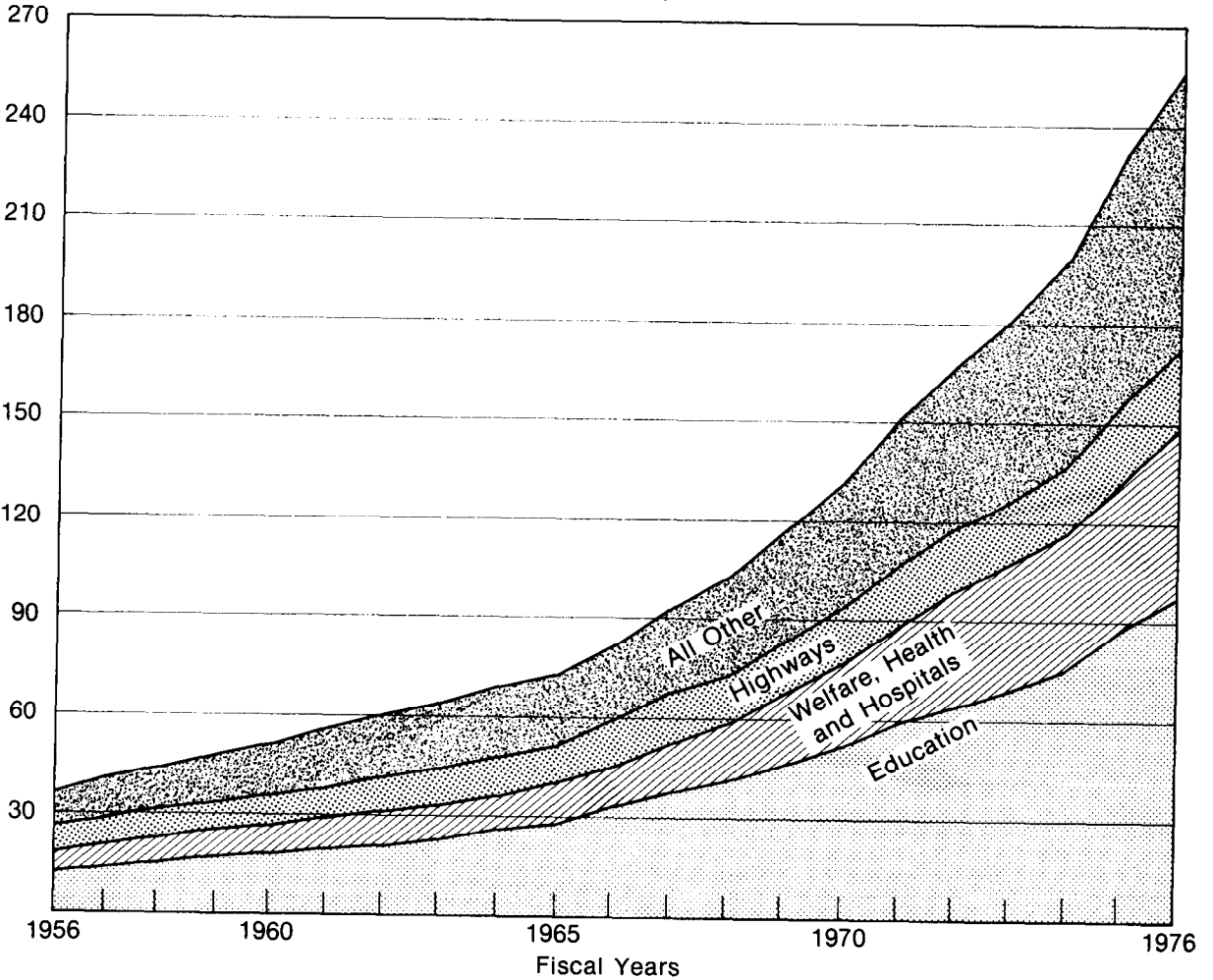

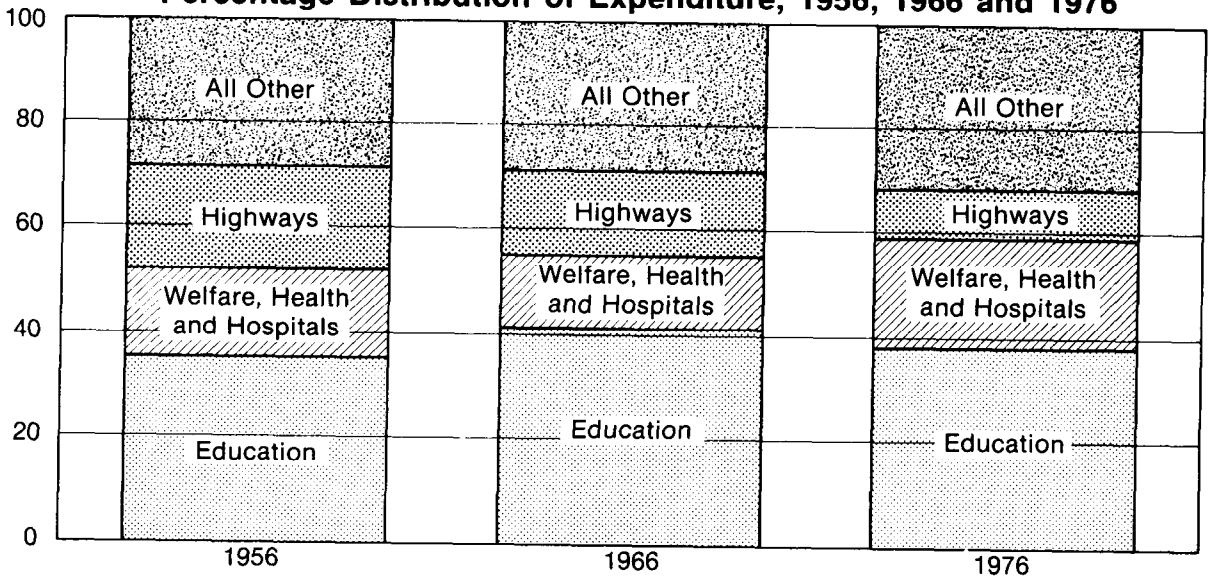

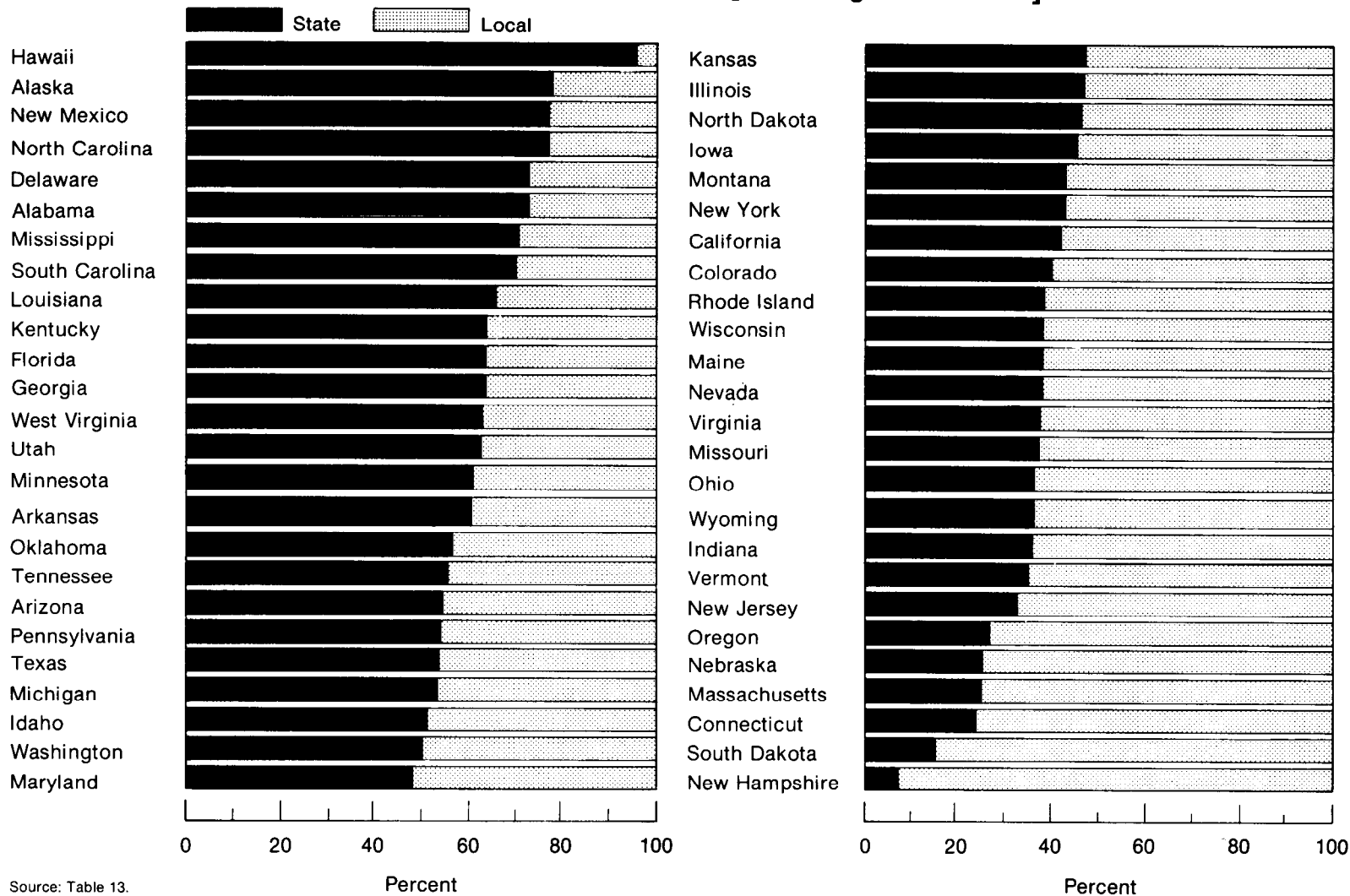

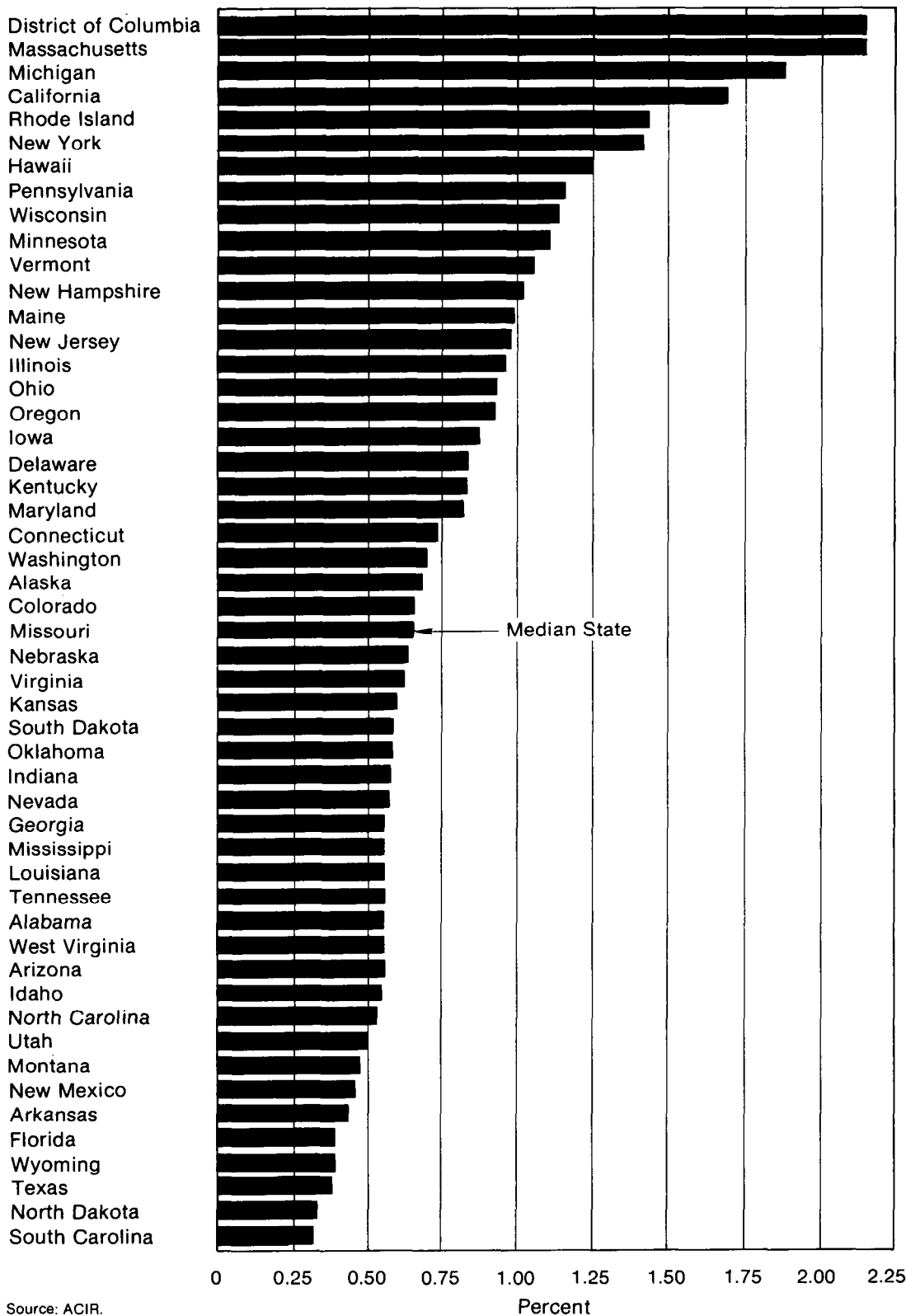

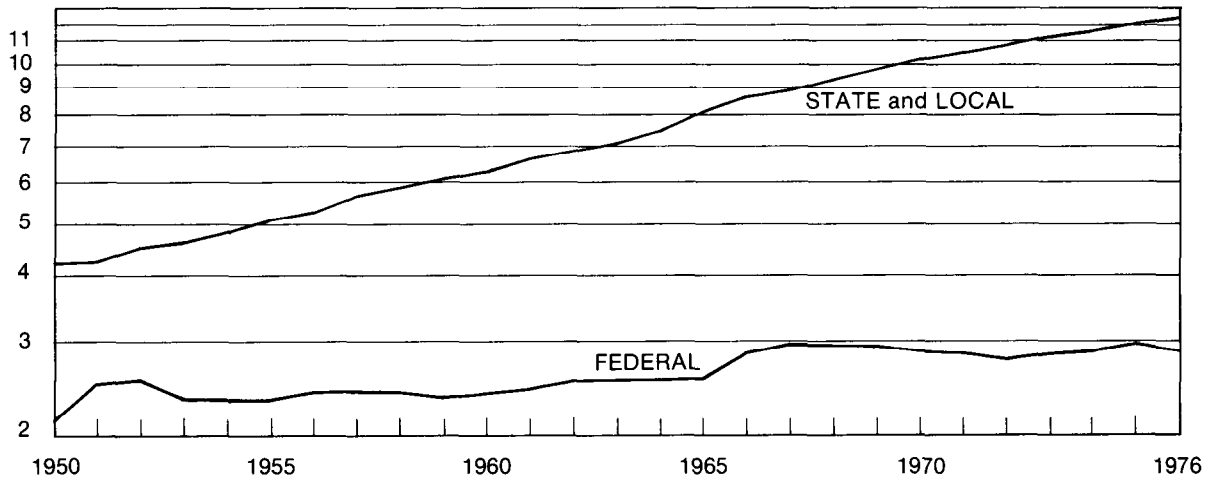

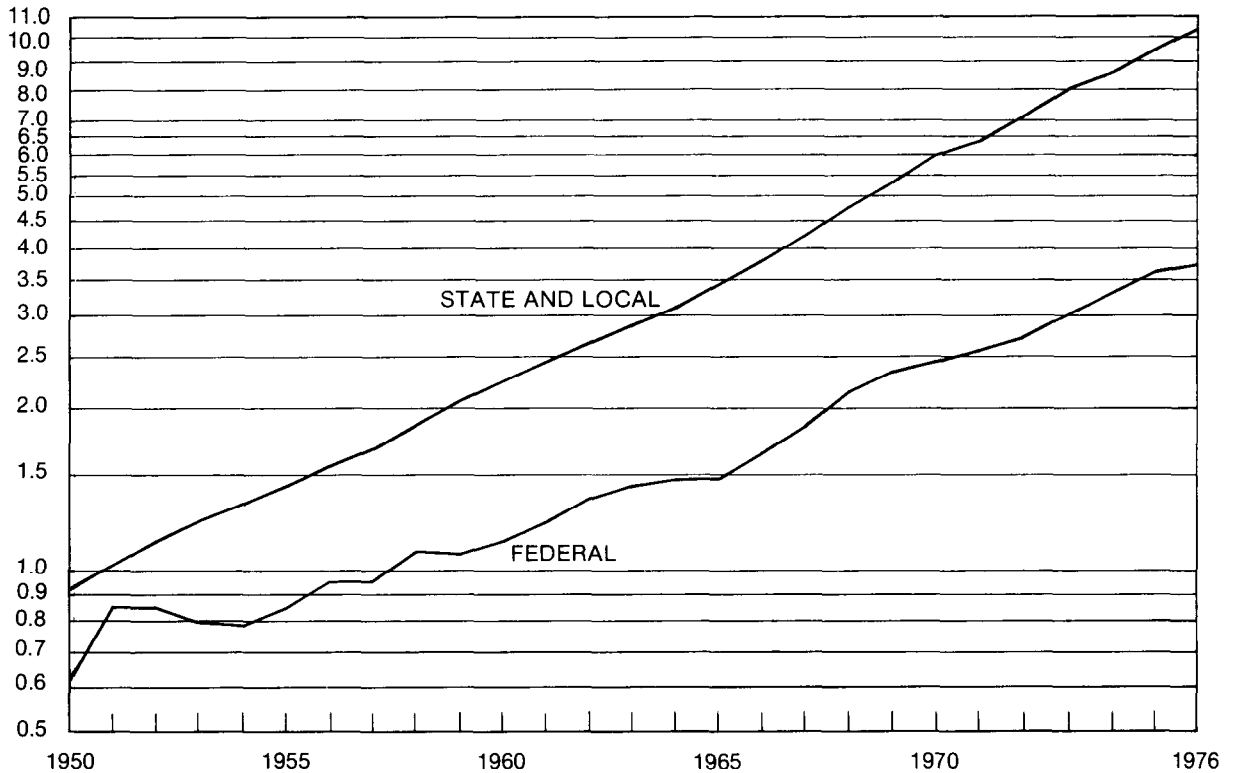
