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A Catalog of Federal Grant-in-Aid Programs to State and Local Governments: Grants Funded FY 1989

As part of its multivolume report on the intergovernmental grant system in 1975, the ACIR identified and counted federal categorical grant-in-aid programs to state and local governments. While there had been earlier compilations of federal assistance programs, ACIR's report was the first to focus exclusively on categorical grants to states and localities. ACIR has updated the catalog at regular intervals (1978, 1981, 1984, and 1987), and the later catalogs were broadened to include the listing of block grants and general revenue sharing. This catalog counts and lists all the federal grant programs funded and available to state and local governments as of January 1, 1989.

Categorical grants are directed at specific, narrowly defined activities, and are distributed in one of the following ways:

Formula:	Distributed by a legislatively or administratively pre- scribed formula (formula grant with open-end reim- bursement means the fed- eral government matches all approved expenditures with- out limit as to amount)
Project:	Distributed at discretion of administrator
Formula/Project:	Discretion of administrator in awarding project grants is constrained by formula, for example, limiting amount that may be awarded within any state

Block grants, in contrast, are used for broad functional areas: and are distributed by statutory formula; funds may be used within broad functional area at the recipient's discretion

General revenue sharing is distributed by statutory formula but with little or no functional restrictions on the use of funds.

478 Categoricals

The number of federal categorical grant-in-aid programs available to state and local governments reached 478 as of January 1, 1989. This 1989 figure represents an increase of 56 programs, or about 13 percent, from the 422 programs counted on January 1, 1987. Eighty-seven programs were added during 1987-88, and 31 were either abolished or their funding was withheld for FY 1989 (see Exhibits 1 and 2).

January 1989 marked the end of the Reagan Administration. The 478 categoricals represent a decline of 56, or 10 percent, from the 534 tallied in January 1981, the beginning of the Reagan tenure. The ACIR count at two intervals within the eight-year span showed a drop of 142 from 1981 to 1984 (534 to 392), when more than 70 categorical grants were consolidated into eight new block grants and many others were abolished by the Congress. This drop was followed by an increase of 30 categoricals from FY 1984 to FY 1987 (392 to 422), a resumption of the increase in number that characterized the pre-Reagan years. The comparable figures at each of six intervals since ACIR began keeping tab in 1975 are shown in the table below.

The number of block grants grew by a net of one from FY 1987 to FY 1989, with the addition of blocks for Mental Health Services for the Homeless and the Community Youth Activity Program, and the discontinuance of the block grant for Alcohol and Drug Abuse Treatment and Rehabilitation.

Dollar outlays for grant programs for these six fiscal years are shown in the following table, which is taken from data prepared by the Office of Management and Budget. These are the best available fiscal data on grants, although the grant classification is slightly different from ACIR's. (In the OMB format, "general purpose" includes, besides general revenue sharing, certain departmental payments and payments to Puerto Rico and the District of Columbia. "Broad-based" includes, in addition to block grants, such items as "school aid in federally affected areas" and, in some years, "local public works for economic stimulus." The table shows the changing mix in the three types of grants. (General revenue sharing, the major general purpose grant, was initiated in 1972 and terminated in 1986).

The categorical grants funded as of January 1, 1989, and their major features, are identified in the body of this catalog. Although the categoricals are again the focus of the analysis, they are preceded in the listing by the 14 block grants funded as of the beginning of 1989.

The increase in the overall number of categorical grants was shared proportionally between formula and

project grants; that is, they retained roughly their onethird (formula) and two-thirds (project) shares from FY 1987 to FY 1989. Within the formula group, the number of project grants distributed by formula continued to decline relatively more than the other two types, indicating that the Congress tended to move away from trying to assure that project grants are allocated among the states on a predetermined basis.

Table 3 shows the breakdown among the four major types of categorical grant programs at the time of each of ACIR's catalogs.

The Changing Functional Mix

Comparing categorical grants in FY 1987 and FY 1989 by function (Table 4) reveals shifts in federal policy emphasis. New grants added tended to focus on issues of substance abuse, the homeless, AIDS, and various facets of education, including bilingualism and functional literacy. The Congress attacked these problems through the grant system by enacting new programs mainly in the fields of elementary, secondary, and vocational education (a net of 19 new programs overall), health (15), and social services (12). The net addition of seven environmental programs reflected mostly more effort to control water pollution, toxic substances, and pesticides contamination.

Other Trends in Categorical Programs

The FY 1987-89 period witnessed a continuation of the long-term trend of a decline in the proportion of programs requiring nonfederal matching. This trend had been reversed during the FY 1981-84 triennium, but resumed in 1985, going from 55.5 percent to 53.6 percent of all categorical programs. In 1989 they dropped further, to 51.3 percent (Table 5). Among the new programs added between 1987 and 1989, 48 percent required matching; among the discontinued programs, 58 percent required it.

As would be expected, the changing functional mix is reflected in the breakdown of grants by department or agency (Table 6). The Department of Education and the Public Health Service (PHS) showed the greatest increase in number of grant programs between FY 1987 and FY 1989. PHS was also the leading expander in the FY 1984 to FY 1987 period, reflecting the government's continuing emphasis on health problems in recent years.

As in other years, the great bulk of new programs added from FY 1987 to FY 1989 (many of them demonstration programs) were relatively small in dollar terms. The median (middle item) of estimated obligations for FY 1989 was \$3.8 million. The mean (average) was \$45.1 million, reflecting the effect of a few large-budget programs, such as CFDA 66.458 (\$1,361 million), a program to help create state revolving funds as a feasible transition to state and local financing of municipal wastewater treatment facilities; and CFDA 13.786 (\$643.5 million), a program to offset part of the costs that state and local governments incur in providing welfare, health, and educational services to eligible legalized aliens.

Over the years, there has been some shifting in the proportion of categorical grant programs directed to various types of recipients identified in this analysis. As seen in Table 7, the percentage going to state governments as exclusive recipients held fairly steady between FY 1975 and FY 1989, whereas the percentage going exclusively to local governments declined somewhat. The big gainer was the group of programs in which nongovernmental organizations (public and private nonprofit) are eligible along with state and local governments (49.4 percent in FY 1989 compared to 44.8 percent in FY 1975).

A Decade of Federal Grants: 1978-1988

As noted earlier, the number of federal grants reached its peak in FY 1981, when it stood at 538. In fiscal terms, however, grants hit their pinnacle three years earlier when they stood at \$77.9 billion in current dollars, or \$109.7 billion in deflated dollars. As seen in Table 8, a decade later grants in current dollars were substantially above their 1978 level but considerably below that level in deflated dollars.—\$93.8 billion.

Table 8 highlights the functional shifts that occurred over the 10-year period. Taking a larger share of the total pie in 1988 than 1978 were health, from 16 percent in 1978 to 28 percent in 1988; income security—18 percent to 27 percent; and transportation—11 percent to 16 percent. Principally responsible for these increases were Medicaid—up from \$10.7 billion to \$30.5 billion; family support payments to states (AFDC mainly)—up from \$6.6 billion to \$10.7 billion; and federal aid highways—up from \$5.8 billion to \$13.2 billion, respectively.

On the downside, the education, training, employment, and social services function dropped from 26 percent to 17 percent of the total aid; community and regional development, from 9 percent to 4 percent; and general government (including general revenue sharing) from 12 percent to 2 percent. The major factors here were the retreat from the large temporary increases in training and employment and local public works that had been instigated for economic stimulus in 1977 and 1978; and the termination of general revenue sharing in 1986.

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In counting grant-in-aid programs for this catalog, ACIR used a slightly modified version of the definition of grants-in-aid used by the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) in its instructions (*Circular No. A-11*, Revised) to executive agencies for preparing and submitting budget estimates. Following is OMB's definition.

... Grants-in-aid ... are defined as budget outlays by the federal government in support of state or local programs of government operations or provision of services to the public

Grants-in-aid include:

- Direct cash grants to state or local governmental units, to other public bodies established under state or local law, or their designee (e.g., federal aid for highway construction);
- Payments for grants-in-kind, such as purchases of commodities distributed to state or local governmental institutions (e.g., school lunch programs);
- Payments to nongovernmental entities when such payments result in cash or in-kind services or products that are passed on to state or local governments (e.g., payments to the Corporation for Public Broadcasting or to the American Printing House for the Blind);
- Payments to regional commissions and organizations that are redistributed at the state or local level to provide public services;
- Federal payments to state and local governments for research and development that is an integral part of the state and local governments' provision of services to the general public (e.g., research on crime control financed from law enforcement assistance grants or on mental health associated with the provision of mental rehabilitation services). See discussion below for exclusions related to research and development and payments for services rendered; and
- Shared revenues, a subcategory of grants. These payments to state or local govern-

Methodology

ments are computed as a percentage of the proceeds from the sale of certain federal property, products, or services (e.g., payments from receipts of Oregon and California grant lands) or are tax collections by the federal government that are passed on to state or local governments (e.g., internal revenue collections for Puerto Rico).

Excluded under this definition are:

- Federal administrative expenses associated with these programs;
- Grants directly to profit-making institutions, individuals, and nonprofit institutions not covered above (e.g., payments to Job Corps Centers and trainees);
- Payments for research and development not directly related to the provision of services to the general public (e.g., basic research);
- Payments for services rendered (e.g., utility services, training programs and expenses for federal employees, research and development for federal purposes conducted under contracts, grants, or agreements by such agencies as the National Institutes of Health, the National Science Foundation, the Department of Energy, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, and the Department of Defense); and
- Federal grants to cover administrative expenses for regional bodies and other funds not redistributed to the states, or their subordinate jurisdictions (e.g., the administrative expenses of the Appalachian Regional Commission).*

The OMB definition is used here with the following exceptions: shared revenues have been excluded, and programs of aid to institutions of higher education have been included only if the aid is exclusively to public institutions of higher education or if state or local governments have a role in the process.

Funded programs meeting these criteria were identified by an examination of the OMB-GSA 1989 Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance, which is a "government-wide compendium of federal programs, projects, services, and activities which provide assistance or benefits to the American public." Programs appearing in the OMB-GSA 1989 Catalog and not in the OMB-GSA 1987 Catalog were checked against their legislative authorization (or executive order in the case of executive orders) to make certain that each such new program conformed to the rule followed in all the ACIR catalogs, i.e., each separately counted program must have a separate legislative authorization. The source used for the legislative authorization research was the United States Code, 1982 Edition, Supplement V, and United States Code, Congressional and Administrative News, 100th Congress, 1988. In cases where a single CFDA listing included more than one legislative authorization, the responsible administrative department or agency was asked to confirm the individual legislative authorizations. Responses were received from all 12 administrative units canvassed.

Data Included

The present ACIR catalog lists the block and categorical grant programs funded on January 1, 1989. The programs are listed by budget subfunction number and within that number by the corresponding number assigned by the OMB-GSA *Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance*. The following information is shown for each program: (1) budget subfunction classification and title, (2) U.S.Code or Public Law reference, (3) grant type (method of distribution), (4) formula data elements, where applicable, (5) eligible grant recipients, (6) maximum federal share, (7) administering agency, and (8) *Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance* number.

The following brief descriptions of these terms may help the reader in using the catalog.

Budget Subfunction—These are the subfunctional categories and numbers that appear in the 1989 Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance, Appendix III.

Grant Type—Formula grants employ a formula to determine each eligible recipient's allotment. Project grants require competitive applications from aspiring recipients. In some cases, competition for project grant funds is constrained by a formula that may, for instance, determine how much money applicants within each state may receive. These grants are termed formula-project grants. Seventeen of the 155 formula-based grant entries are marked with an asterisk to indicate their open-end character.

Formula Data Elements—These are the 13 major categories of statistical series used in formula grants as identified by the U.S. General Accounting Office in its publication *Grants Formulas: A Catalog of Federal Aids to* States and Localities, Washington, DC, 1987, GAO/ HRD-87-28. The GAO report is as of fiscal year 1984. ACIR has applied the GAO classification to formula grant programs added between FY 1984 and FY 1989.

Federal Share — The numbers listed in this column indicate the maximum percentage of program costs to be paid by federal funds. The number 100 indicates a grant with no matching requirements. It does not mean the federal grant actually covers 100% of the cost of the aided program or activity; it only means the recipient is not required to match any portion of the federal grant. The "cost shared" (CS) category includes all those grants where some recipient contribution is required, but the exact amount is not specified. In such cases, the match may be the subject of negotiation, or may be set by the appropriate Secretary. Other symbols are used to indicate when a matching ratio is variable for different recipients, changes over time, or is different for different activities of types of recipients.

Agency—This column indicates the responsible administering agency for each grant. Except for the Department of Health and Human Services, subdepartmental units are not indicated.

CFDA Number—This is the number assigned the program in the 1989 Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance.

The key on page 15 lists and explains the full range of entries for type of grant, formula data elements, recipient, federal share, and administering agency.

- E. Labor—includes civilian labor force, unemployment levels, and employment statistics.
- F. Transportation—includes series, such as miles of highways and rail, aviation facilities, number of vehicles, and number of miles traveled.
- G. Energy—includes energy consumption, heating and cooling degree days, levels of energy conservation, fuel costs, and residential heating/cooling equipment.
- H. Government—includes taxation, expenditures, government employment, and salary levels.
- I. Health—includes illness data, vital statistics, and levels of health-related expenditures.
- J. Price Indices—includes consumer prices, producer prices, and inflation levels.
- K. Housing—includes number of units, condition of units, vacancy rates, and age of housing stock.
- L. Economic Sectors includes business activity, manufacturing, retail trade, and agricultural statistics.
- M. Miscellaneous Measures of Program Costs/Activity Levels—includes series such as number of meals or number of pints of milk served, other income received by an agency, estimated costs to complete a project, the number of eligible recipients, and prior-year program expenditures.

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What is ACIR?

The Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations (ACIR) was created by the Congress in 1959 to monitor the operation of the American federal system and to recommend improvements. ACIR is a permanent national bipartisan body representing the executive and legislative branches of federal, state, and local government and the public.

The Commission is composed of 26 members—nine representing the federal government, 14 representing state and local government, and three representing the public. The President appoints 20—three private citizens and three federal executive officials directly, and four governors, three state legislators, four mayors, and three elected county officials from slates nominated by the National Governors' Association, the National Conference of State Legislatures, the National League of Cities, U.S. Conference of Mayors, and the National Association of Counties. The three Senators are chosen by the President of the Senate and the three Representatives by the Speaker of the House of Representatives.

Each Commission member serves a two-year term and may be reappointed.

As a continuing body, the Commission addresses specific issues and problems, the resolution of which would produce improved cooperation among the levels of government and more effective functioning of the federal system. In addition to dealing with important functional and policy relationships among the various governments, the Commission extensively studies critical governmental finance issues. One of the long-range efforts of the Commission has been to seek ways to improve federal, state, and local governmental practices and policies to achieve equitable allocation of resources and increased efficiency and equity.

In selecting items for the research program, the Commission considers the relative importance and urgency of the problem, its manageability from the point of view of finances and staff available to ACIR, and the extent to which the Commission can make a fruitful contribution toward the solution of the problem.

After selecting specific intergovernmental issues for investigation, ACIR follows a multistep procedure that assures review and comment by representatives of all points of view, all affected levels of government, technical experts, and interested groups. The Commission then debates each issue and formulates its policy position. Commission findings and recommendations are published and draft bills and executive orders developed to assist in implementing ACIR policy recommendations.
