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

### PREFACE

The Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations was established by Public Law 380, passed by the first session of the 86th Congress and approved by the President September 24, 1959. Sec. 2 of the act sets forth the following declaration of purpose and specific responsibilities for the Commission.

"Sec. 2. Because the complexity of modern life intensifies the need in a federal form of government for the fullest cooperation and coordination of activities between the levels of government, and because population growth and scientific developments portend an increasingly complex society in future years, it is essential that an appropriate agency be established to give continuing attention to intergovernmental problems."

Pursuant to its statutory responsibilities, the Commission from time to time singles out for attention activities which in the Commission's view would enhance cooperation among the different levels of government and thereby improve the effectiveness of our Federal system of government. One area of problems so identified by the Commission concerns the wide range of statistical data needed for the study and understanding of metropolitan area growth and problems by the public and private agencies concerned. A large and growing body of such data are collected and published by the Federal Government, but public knowledge of the availability of this information is often inadequate. In recognition of the need for a reference document which would identify the metropolitan area statistics currently available from the Federal Government, the following Directory has been prepared.

This informational report was adopted at a meeting of the Commission held on June 29, 1962.

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#### I. INTRODUCTION

The expansion of metropolitan areas over the past two decades has been accompanied by increasing research effort into the problems generated by this development and by a growing body of statistical data to support the research and provide a basis for public policy. Communication between the collectors of statistical data and those who conduct research and formulate policy is often inadequate, however, for proper coordination of these activities. The present document has been prepared by the Commission in an effort to bridge this communication gap between a large segment of data-gathering agencies, the Federal Government, and State and local officials and other users of statistical information for metropolitan areas.

The document is essentially a tabular index, by major and detailed subject, to all data regularly published by the Federal Government for standard metropolitan statistical areas and their constituent geographic units. It is anticipated that this Directory will be useful to individuals and organizations, both public and private, who are involved in metropolitan area research and governmental operations. These include Federal, State and local government agencies, urban research and planning organizations, the business community and various social service, market research, trade and labor organizations.

The decision to prepare such a directory of Federal statistics for metropolitan

areas originated in a recommendation of the Committee for Economic Development. In its publication, Guiding Metropolitan Growth, the CED called attention to the need for a reference source which would identify the large and growing body of data collected and published for metropolitan areas, and proposed that the Commission prepare an index for this purpose. As a result of this recommendation a meeting was held, attended by representatives of a number of public and private organizations, including the CED and the Commission. At this meeting the representatives of the Bureau of the Budget agreed to compile an Inventory of Federal Statistics for Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas, Counties, and Cities, which was published by that agency in January 1961. At a subsequent meeting the recommendation was made that the Commission publish a considerably expanded and detailed directory. The Commission, at its meeting of March 10, 1961, approved the initiation of such a project and the present document is the result.

It is hoped that dissemination of this reference guide will both contribute to public knowledge of the availability of statistical data sources and further stimulate inquiry into the economic, social, and governmental questions deriving from the growth of metropolitan areas.

#### II. EXPLANATORY NOTES

#### A. Scope

The statistical sources described in this report meet the following specifications:

- 1. They are compiled by the Federal Government.
  - 2. They are published.
- 3. The data are reported on a regularly recurring basis, ranging from weekly to decennial.
- 4. The data are reported for Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas or their constituent geographic units. (See Section B below.) Data which are not reported for the whole SMSA, can be built up to SMSA totals if they are reported for counties. Where the data are reported only for cities, urban places or some unit smaller than counties, SMSA totals cannot be derived. This smaller area coverage is included, however, because it can be useful in conjunction with other data which are reported for metropolitan areas as a whole.

All known statistical series meeting these specifications as of March, 1962 are included in the Directory.

## B. Arrangement of Tables

- 1. The series are grouped alphabetically by 28 major subject categories.
- 2. Under each major category, the series are further grouped according to whether or not they are reported in an official Census. When the subject matter within a major category is not reported in one of these Censuses, the designation "Periodic" appears. Most of the "periodic" data are derived from sample surveys, as are the detailed Census cross-tabulations.
- 3. The series are grouped according to category, irrespective of the source publication in which they are reported. For example, a great deal of personal and family income data are

reported in the Census of Population. These are indexed under the category "Income and Earnings" rather than Population. Appropriate cross-references by category are provided in head notes to the tables.

- 4. The first column in each table, "Subject," approximates a table title in the reference source. Those Census tables which include a great deal of varied data are not described intact; the "Subject" may refer to a major stub head. These subjects are also arranged alphabetically within the "Census" and "Periodic" grouping of each major category.
- 5. Column 2, "Tabular Detail," describes the column heads and line stubs in the most recent published tables. The following system of notation has been used to designate the dimensional aspects of these tables:
  - a. The flush line (or group of bracketed flush lines) shows major data classifications.
  - b. A 5-space indentation indicates data sub-classified by the characteristics of the preceding flush line or lines.
    - c. Continued lines are indented 2 spaces.
  - d. A colon indicates that all the classifications preceding it apply to each classification following on that line; it usually signifies "by."
  - e. A semicolon is used to mark off individual classifications; it usually signifies "and."
  - f. Numbers in parentheses show the number of classes or categories into which the data are grouped.
  - g. The units in which data are reported are also shown in parentheses, where they are not indicated by head notes or line descriptions.
  - h. Footnotes refer to the immediately preceding classification. If the footnoted item is followed by a colon, the note refers to the whole line. The footnotes are renumbered for each subject in Column 1.

j. An asterisk following a classification indicates data also reported in Dept. of Commerce, Bureau of the Census, County and City Data Book (1962). The 1962 edition of this volume contains substantial revisions from earlier editions. The asterisk, therefore, refers only to content of the 1962 edition, which reports for SMSA's, urbanized areas and urban places of 25,000 or more as well as counties and cities. Many of the series published in the County and City Data Book, and some additional series, are published in Dept. of Commerce, Bureau of the Census, Congressional District Data Book, 1961. In this volume data are reported for all congressional districts, whole county congressional districts and selected congressional districts with 10 percent or more nonwhite population.

6. The geographic areas for which the data are reported are identified separately by column head. An "X" in the column indicates that the data are reported for each such area in the U. S. Where the data are reported for areas of a certain population size or of a particular definition, those characteristics are identified in the column or in a footnote. A plus sign following the population figures means "or more;" a minus sign means "less than." Differences in area coverage for earlier years are noted only when the earlier coverage was narrower in scope (data reported for larger population-size units) than the current coverage. Data for different types of areas are sometimes reported in separate tables within one source; this occurs most commonly in the Census of Population. Census tract data appear in a separate volume.

In addition to the areas identified in the tables, much of the data are also reported for larger geographic totals, such as all metropolitan areas, and population-size groups.

The following areas involve special definition:

#### a. SMSA

The standard metropolitan area concept (SMA) was first introduced into Federal statistics in 1950, and was defined by the Bureau of the Budget as a county or group of contiguous counties (towns in New England) containing at least one city of 50,000 or more population. Contiguous counties were included in an SMA according to specified criteria of social and economic integration with the central city. In 1959 the Bureau of the Budget revised these criteria somewhat and the new metropolitan definition was designated standard metropolitan statistical area (SMSA).<sup>1</sup>

Unless otherwise specified in headnotes or footnotes data reported since 1959 refer to SMSA's and data reported between 1950 and 1958 refer to SMA's. Where the tables indicate that a series originated prior to 1950, any SMA coverage for those data is reported only since 1950 (SMSA since 1959) unless otherwise specified.

The number of SMSA's for which data are reported increases as new areas attain "metropolitan status" under the Budget Bureau definition. Therefore, when the SMSA column indicates "all" or all over a certain population size, the total number reported may vary with the year of reporting. Natural growth, and, to a lesser degree, changes in definition, resulted in boundary changes for 40 metropolitan areas between 1950 and 1960;² for all other areas the data reported in these two years are comparable.

#### b. Urbanized Area

This concept is used only in the Censuses of Population and Housing, and was defined by the Census Bureau in 1950 as an area that

includes at least one city with 50,000 inhabitants or more and the surrounding closely settled incorporated places and unincorporated areas that meet specified criteria of urbanism.<sup>3</sup> The boundaries of an urbanized area do not follow political boundaries, and change from one Census to another. Data for urbanized areas are reported only since 1950.

#### c. Counties

Since counties are, excepting New England, the geographic "building blocks" of standard metropolitan statistical areas, county by county figures can generally be added to obtain totals for individual SMSA's. Statistical series shown here as being published for counties are not limited, however, to metropolitan counties, but are typically available for all of the more than 3,100 county-type areas in the United States. Nearly all of these are actually counties as commonly recognized, served individually by county governments. However, a limited number of them are other kinds of local areas (such as the "independent cities" of Virginia and a few other cities located outside any "county") which are generally treated as county-equivalent areas in the reporting of Federal statistics.

#### d. Cities

This column is used whenever the data source so designates this area of coverage. In some sources, however, particularly in the periodic data, the designation is not always used according to its strict legal definition. Notes to the data sources usually define precisely the area of coverage. "C.C." is an abbreviation for central city of a standard metropolitan statistical area.

#### e. Urban Places

In the 1960 Censuses of Population and Housing urban places include both incorporated and unincorporated places of 2,500 inhabitants or more and the towns and townships classified as urban. In the 1960 Census "places" were not designated specifically as urban, but "incorporated" and "unincorporated" were frequently separated.4

The "Urban Places" column, which refers to Census-designated "places" as well as "urban places", also includes cities where the source reports the data for both types of area designation. Of course, a large number of urban places are, in fact, cities.

The Census of Governments reports data by "municipality", which is defined in terms of a local unit of government and includes cities, boroughs, towns (other than New England, New York and Wisconsin), and villages.<sup>5</sup> The "Urban Places" column is used for this designation, but the specific definition used in this Census must be kept in mind. The other units of local government, in addition to counties, for which the Census of Governments reports, townships, school districts and special districts, are designated in the column headed "Minor Civil Divisions."

#### f. Minor Civil Divisions

Only Census of Population data are reported for all minor civil divisions, which include a great variety of political or administrative subdivisions set up by the States.<sup>6</sup> Data for minor civil divisions are published less frequently and in less detail in the more recent Censuses than in earlier ones.

#### g. Census Tracts

Census tracts are small areas into which large cities and metropolitan areas have been divided for statistical purposes. The boundaries are drawn initially for a homogeneous neighborhood, and every effort is made to maintain the boundaries over a long period of time in order to make comparisons of these neighborhoods from Census to Census. Only Census of Population and Housing data are reported by census tract, and have been published since 1940. The number of tracted areas has increased since that Census as follows:

#### h. City Blocks

City blocks are used only in the Census of Housing. Data for these areas were first published in 1940 when the Census of Housing was published separately for the first time. Since only one subject entry in the Directory is reported for city blocks, this geographic unit is designated in a footnote rather than a column.

#### i. Places

This column heading is used only in the tables showing periodic data, where there is a great diversity of area coverage among the sources tabulated. The definition of "Place" for the subject reported is identified in the column or the notes.

- 7. The frequency with which the various Censuses are reported is shown in the title of each table reporting Census data. The frequency of the periodic data is shown for each subject in a separate column, headed "Frequency".
- 8. The "Date of Origin" is shown for each classification described in the "Tabular Detail" column. Although the source table may have been published for a long period of time, new data classifications are introduced and old ones eliminated from time to time.

For these long historical series, the user of this Directory should refer to the text of the source publications in question to be certain that the figures for earlier years are comparable with current figures to the degree of accuracy he requires. All of the reporting agencies continually refine their data coverage and statistical techniques. Where such refinements, of changes in definition, have resulted in a clear break in the continuity of a series, the "Date of Origin" shown here refers to the date of that break. A footnote will usually indicate that the earlier series are not comparable. Some of the major changes in definition are described in Section C below.

Arrangement of the tables in the data sources also varies over long periods of time. The table titles and classification of detail shown here describe the most recent publication of the series.

9. The column headed "Source" contains a coded reference to the publication reporting the data described. Full citations for individual sources are listed in Section IV, page 115. Where

the same data are reported in more than one publication, all such sources are cited. Where it is noted that data reported in two different publications are comparable, careful reference should be made to the text in these sources for limitations on comparability. Where some subjects seem to be duplicated in different sources, the figures are not comparable, unless so indicated, because of differing methods of reporting.

With respect to Census data, volume and part numbers refer to the latest Census; for earlier Censuses, the number of the volume containing the relevant data may vary.

# C. Definitions Affecting Comparability of Data

Users of this Directory should consult the texts of all the sources reported herein for changes in definition and techniques of estimating and reporting which affect comparability of statistical series over time. The Census publications, particularly, discuss these matters in detail. Some of the more important recent changes in definition are described below.

#### Census of Agriculture

1. The Census Bureau definition of "farm" was changed in 1959. For the Census of Agriculture, this change affected chiefly the count of farms and the differences resulting are shown in the 1959 Census.

#### Census of Housing

- 2. In 1960 the unit of reporting in the Census of Housing was changed from "dwelling unit" to "housing unit." The latter is a more inclusive term. The change affects chiefly the count of one-room dwellings, and is most critical in census tracts or city blocks containing a high proportion of such dwellings.
- 3. The Census Bureau redefinition of "rural farm" and "rural nonfarm" in 1960 affected the comparability with earlier Census of Population and Census of Housing data for these classifications.

#### Census of Population

4. Since 1950, the Census of Population has enumerated resident college students in the

location of the college; prior to that date they were enumerated at their parent's residence. This change affects the comparability of population data in communities with a large proportion of college students.

- 5. Labor force data since 1940 are not comparable with earlier years when a definition of "gainful workers" was used.
- 6. Occupation data included Armed Forces in 1940 and 1950, but not in 1960.
- 7. 1940 and 1950 data on "weeks worked" are not strictly comparable with 1960.

#### Census of Population and Housing

8. In the Censuses of Population and Housing, "group quarters" reported in 1960 is similar to "quasi-households" reported in 1950.

#### Census of Business

9. Important differences in definition and changes in classifications were made between the 1948 and 1954 Censuses. These are explained in the introductions and appendices to the 1954 Census volumes. The 1958 Census of Business used the new (1957) Standard Industrial Classification (SIC) and this affected comparability with 1954 of data reported by "kind-of-business."

#### Censuses of Manufactures and Minerals Industries

10. The 1957 SIC was used in the 1958 Censuses of Manufactures and Minerals Industries.

based on the revised classifications. The 1954 Censuses used the 1945 SIC.7

#### D. Unpublished Data

Most of the agencies whose publications are included in this Directory possess a large amount of raw or partially tabulated data which they do not publish. Much of this is available from the agency at cost. These unpublished data are often more detailed with respect to both cross-tabulation and geographic coverage. The data reported in the County and City Data Book, published by the Bureau of the Census, are available on punch cards or computer tapes which can be purchased in total or for specified areas or subjects for the cost of the cards or tapes.

Many of the series published by agencies such as the Bureau of Labor Statistics, the Bureau of Employment Security, and the Office of Education, are summaries of data gathered by State agencies; consequently, State government figures available for these subjects are often more detailed.

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# The Federal Statistical System

#### 1. GENERAL COORDINATION

The statistical organization of the Federal Government has developed in a decentralized pattern, with different agencies having responsibilities for the collection, compilation or analysis of statistical data in specified areas. A central statistical office is therefore required to achieve an integrated and accurate system of governmental statistics and to prevent duplication.

# OFFICE OF STATISTICAL STANDARDS BUREAU OF THE BUDGET

Develops a single coordinated statistical system in the Federal Government. Prevents duplication of statistics and reduces reporting burdens. Develops and enforces standards for the quality and comparability of data.

#### 2. GENERAL-PURPOSE STATISTICAL AGENCIES

The primary function of these agencies is collection, compilation and publication of statistics for general use. Each of these agencies is responsible for the regular collection, analysis and publication of data in specified fields. As a group, they account for a large proportion of Federal statistical activities.

# STATISTICAL REPORTING SERVICE (Dept. of Agriculture)

Statistics on crop and livestock production; prices received and paid by farmers; farm employment and wage rates. Special surveys.

#### BUREAU OF LABOR STATISTICS (Dept. of Labor)

Statistics on labor force, employment and unemployment; earnings, manhours and wage rates; productivity; industrial injuries; industrial relations; wholesale and retail prices; urban consumer price indexes; foreign labor conditions.

#### BUREAU OF THE CENSUS (Dept. of Commerce)

Censuses of population, housing, agriculture, manufactures, mineral industries, business, governments. Current statistics in these areas, and in foreign trade, shipping, construction.

#### NATIONAL CENTER FOR HEALTH STATISTICS (Dept. of Health, Education, and Welfare)

Statistics on morbidity, health care, and demographic, social and economic factors related to health; and on births, deaths, marriages and divorces.

#### 3. ANALYTIC AND RESEARCH AGENCIES

These agencies are major users of data collected by the public-purpose agencies, the administrative and regulatory agencies, and private sources. They are particularly important in the compilation, analysis and interpretation of statistics, though some direct collection of statistics for general use is involved in their activities.

## COUNCIL OF ECONOMIC ADVISERS (Executive Office of the President)

Analyses of economic data on the general economic situation, and appraisal of related Federal activities. Assists the President in preparation of his economic reports to the Congress.

#### ECONOMIC RESEARCH SERVICE (Dept. of Agriculture)

Analyses of economic situation and outlook for farm products. Research and statistical studies on farm population, prices and income; food consumption and marketing margins; agricultural finance, farm costs and returns, and agricultural productivity.

# OFFICE OF BUSINESS ECONOMICS (Dept. of Commerce)

Estimates of national income; gross national product, inter-industry sales and purchases, and related data on business developments; analyses of business trends; estimates of the balance of international payments and of foreign investments.

# BOARD OF GOVERNORS OF THE FEDERAL RESERVE SYSTEM

Analyzes economic and credit conditions. Prepares and publishes statistics on money, banking, international finance, industrial production, consumer credit, and department store activities for general public use.

# HOUSEHOLD ECONOMICS RESEARCH DIVISION (ARS, Dept. of Agriculture)

Statistics of household food consumption, dietary adequacy and rural family living.

# BUSINESS AND DEFENSE SERVICES ADMIN. (Dept. of Commerce)

Analyzes and disseminates information on the condition and levels of business activity in specific industries and trades.

# BUREAU OF INTERNATIONAL PROGRAMS (Dept. of Commerce)

Analyses of data compiled by the Census Bureau on U.S. foreign trade, and of data on trade of other countries.

## BUREAU OF MINES

Current statistics on production, consumption and stocks of metals, mineral fuels and other nonmetallic minerals; employment and injuries in mineral industries. Studies and analyses in these areas.

#### 4. ADMINISTRATIVE, REGULATORY AND DEFENSE AGENCIES

These agencies provide many important and valuable statistical series used by the public and other agencies of the Government. They collect statistical information primarily as part of their administrative and operating responsibilities, such as the collection of taxes or regulation of public utilities, though a few of them have specialized statistical responsibilities.

#### EXPLANATORY NOTE

The various agencies and units are arranged on this chart to indicate the essential structure of the statistical activities of the Federal Government. Only those agencies and units whose statistical functions are readily identified are included. Some of the agencies might well be listed under several of the major categories, but to prevent excessive detail, they are classified under a single category. While all agencies have some performance or operational data, this chart considers such statistics only when they have also been adapted for general analytic use. A more detailed description of the system is presented in "Statistical Services of the United States Government."
