Characteristics of Federal Grant-in-Aid Programs to State and Local Governments: Grants Funded FY 1993

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Executive Summary

The total number of federal grants to state and local governments increased from 557 to 593 between 1991 and 1993. Grant outlays rose to \$206.4 billion in 1993 from \$152 billion in 1491, an increase of 36 percent (29 percent in constant dollars).

The largest numbers of new categorical grants were added in health (11); education, training, employment, and social services (7); and natural resources and environment (6). A new surface transportation block grant was created by the *Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act of 1991*. Other new block grants are for community mental health service and substance abuse prevention and treatment.

Federal grants-in-aid to state and local governments have changed dramatically in type, number, dollar amount, and other characteristics since 1966. Until then, all federal grants were for narrow categorical programs with specific purposes and tight federal spending requirements. In 1966, the first block grant was enacted to authorize a broader range of spending by state and local governments. providing greater latitude for decisionmaking by states and localities. The number of block grants grew to 15 by 1993.

General Kevenue Sharing funds that could be spent with virtually no restrictions were provided to state governments from 1972 to 1981 and to local governments from 1973 to 1986.

The number of categorical programs grew dramatically from 422 in 1975 to 534 in 1981, dropped to 392 in 1984, and then rose slowly to 543 in 1991 and a high of 578 for 1993.

There have been significant changes in the amount of grant outlays from FY 1975 to FY 1993. More than 70 per-

cent of the money in the grant system has been distributed through categorical programs, but block grants have carved out a 10-15 percent portion. General Revenue Sharing declined from 15.9 percent of total outlays in 1973 to 4.6 percent in 1986, its last year.

In general, about three-fourths of all grant aid is distributed by formulas, with the rest distributed on a discretionary basis by federal agencies. Medicaid, the largest formula program, accounts for about 39 percent of all grant outlays.

The purposes of federal grants also have changed significantly. Measured by outlays, grants for health programs rose from 9.1 percent to 40.9 percent of the total, while income security remained at about 27 percent and then dropped to 23 percent for 1993. Education, training, employment, and social services outlays dropped from 20.1 percent to 16.9 percent of the total, and community and regional development fell from 4.5 percent to 3.3 percent. Transportation outlays dropped substantially—from 31.6 percent to 11.4 percent of the total.

The grant system was simplified in the 1970s and early 1980s, giving states and localities more discretion in the use of funds. Grant consolidation spurted in the early 1980s, mainly through the 1981Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act, but has shown little movement since then, although it is often mentioned in connection with proposals for the federal government to devolve more responsibility to the states.

The main avenue of federal grant-in-aid expansion continues to be the categorical grant. The number of project grants continues to show the greatest growth among the several types of categoricals, constituting in 1993 the highest percentage of all such grants since 1975.

This volume is the seventh update of ACIR's report on the characteristics of federal grant-in-aid programs. The first report was published in 1975. This update covers congressional action from January 1, 1991, through December 31, 1992. It provides a snapshot of the scope and principal features of federal grant programs as of Fiscal Year 1993. and comments on major trends in categorical and block grants.

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Introduction

Highlights

The number of federal grants to state and local governments increased from 557 to 593 from 1991 to 1993, continuing the upward trend of the past decade. Thirty-five categorical grants and one block grant were added.

The largest numbers of new grants were added in health (11); education, training, employment and social services (7); and natural resources and environment (6).

Grant outlays rose from \$152 billion in 1901 to \$206.4 billion (estimated) in 1993, or 36 percent. In constant dollars, the increase was 29 percent.

Aprincipal cause of the outlay increase was the federal-state Medicaid program, which went from \$52.5 billion to \$80.5 billion (estimated) in the two years. or 53 percent. It accounted for over one-half of the total increase in grant outlays.

As part of its multivolume report on the intergovernmental grant system in 1975, the Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations (ACIR) identified, counted, and examined the characteristics of federal categorical grant-in-aid programs to state and local governments. Although there had been earlier compilations of federal assistance programs, ACIR's report was the first to focus exclusively on categorical grants and, thereby, portray an accurate picture of the federal grant system.

ACIR updated the report at regular intervals (1978, 1981, 1984, 1987, 1989, and 1991). The later reports were broadened to list and describe the characteristics of block grants and General Revenue Sharing (GKS). This update for FY 1993 includes all the federal grant programs funded and available to state and local governments as of January

1, 1993. It also identifies major changes in the basic features of the grants and the grant system.

Categorical grants are directed at specific, narrowly defined activities and are distributed in one of the following ways:

Formula: Distributed through a legislatively or administratively prescribed formula. A formula grant with openend reimbursement means that the federal government matches all approved expenditures without limit.

Project: Distributed at the discretion of the administrator. These are sometimes called discretionary grants.

Formula/Project: Discretion of the administrator in awarding project grants is constrained by a formula. for example, one limiting the amount that may be awarded to or within any state.

Block grants, which are used for broad functional areas, are distributed by statutory formula and m+' be used at the recipient's discretion. host block grants are awarded to state governments, but a few go directly to local governments (e.g., Community Development Block Grant).

General Revenue Sharing was distributed by statutory formula with little or no functional restrictions on the use of funds. This form of funding was provided by the federal government to local governments from 1972 to 1986 and to state governments from 1972 to 1981.

Grant Programs in 1993

The numbers of funded federal categorical and block grant programs available to state and local governments from FY 1975 to FY 1993 are shown in Table I.

The 578 categorical programs funded as of January 1993mark the largest number of these grants since this series was started in FY 1975. The previous high was 534 in 1981, at theend of the Carter administration. The number dropped to 392 between 1981 and 1984, the first three years of the Reagan administration, but since has gone steadily upward. For FY 1989 to FY 1993, the years of the Bush administration, the number of categoricals rose from 478 to 578, or 21 percent.

The 578 programs for FY 1993 represent an increase of 35, or 6 percent, over the 543 programs available on January 1, 1991. During 1992-93, 74 categorical programs were added and 39 were either abolished or consolidated, or their funding was withheld for FY 1993 (see Exhibits 1 and 2).

The drop in the number of categorical grants in the early Reagan years was traceable to reduced funding and, as indicated in Table 1 and Figure 1, to the increase in the number of block grants from five to 12 from 1981 to 1984. The largest change came via the 1981 Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act, which consolidated 77 categorical programs into nine new or revised block grants. Since that time, other block grants have been proposed, including President Hush's FY 1992 and 1993 consolidated block grant proposals ("turnovers"), but a net of only three new block grants was added by the Congress. Between fiscal years 1991 and 1993, two health block grants were terminated and two were added: Community Youth Activity (CFD.4 93.171) and Alcohol. Drug Abuse and Mental Health Services (CFDA 93.892) were dropped, and Prevention and 'Treatment of Substance Abuse (CFDA 93.959) and Community Health Services (CFDA 93.958) were added. In addition, the Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act of 1991 established the Surface Transportation block grant (CFDA 20.205), thereby increasing the total number of block grants to 15 in 1993 (Figure 1).

Grant Outlays

Dollar outlays for grants to state and local governments for FY 1975-1993 are shown in Table 2 and Figures 2 and 3. They are taken from budget documents of the Office of Management and Budget, supplemented for FY 1993 with estimates from the 1993 Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance. These are the best available fiscal data on grants, although the classifications are slightly different from AC1R's. In the OMB format, "general purpose" includes, besides General Revenue Sharing, certain departmental payments and payments to Puerto Kico and the District of Columbia. "Rroad-based" includes, in addition to block grants, such items as "school impact aid" and "customs forfeiture." The changing mix in the three classes of grants is shown in the table.

The middle part of Table 2 and Figure 3 show grant outlay figures adjusted for inflation (1987 = 100.0). While outlays rose uninterruptedly (although at varying speeds) in current dollars from 1975through 1993, in constant dollars, they reached an early peak in 1978(\$129.2billion), after which they declined through 1984 and had not regained their 1978level by 1991. With a big jump forward, however, they are estimated to hit \$166.9billion in 1993 (\$206.4 billion in current dollars).

From the bottom set of figures in Table 2, it is apparent that categoricals dominate the general types of grant, with 88 percent of total outlays for 1993. This dominance has grown steadily, especially since 1984.

Categorical Grants: Major Features and Trends

The categorical grants funded as of January 1, 1993, and their major features are identified in this report. Although the categoricals are again the focus of the analysis. they are preceded in the listing by the 15 block grants funded as of January 1993.

Formula-Based vs. Project Grants

The number of project grants increased to 72.5 percent of categorical grants, continuing the upward trend of 1989-91 and marking the highest percentage of the total since 1975. The breakdown of the major types of categoricals is shown in Table 3. Figure 4 displays the trends in graphic form.

The Changing Functional Mix

Comparing categorical grants in FY 1991 and FY 1993 by function (Table 4) indicates a continuation of trends of 1989-91. The largest net number of new grants (Exhibit 1) were in health (11); education, training, employment and social services (7); and natural resources and environment (6). In the health group, the number of new grants for substance abuse and AIDS/HIV-related programs was largely offset by discontinuance of earlier grants, so that the net overall increase in health programs was due to new grants for such areas as public housing residents, rural health. TB, Alzheimer's disease, and emergency medical services (EMS). 'The added programs in natural resources and environment, and education and social services were for a wide mixture of purposes.

Notable among the grants dropped between 1991 and 1993 (Exhibit 2) were Construction Grants for Waste Water Treatment Works (CFDA66.418) and the programs for Federal Aid Highways—Primary, Secondary, and Urban Systems (CFDA 20.205). The latter were superseded by the new National Highway System grant and the Surface Transportation block grant created by the *Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act of 1991*.

Block Grants in Effect, 1966-1993








Other Trends

In the FY 1991-93 period, the proportion of programs requiring state or local matching funds increased from 49.9 percent to 51.6 percent (Table 5). This marked a reversal of the trend of decline in matching requirements from 55 percent in 1985 to 49.9 percent in 1991. In the past two years, 51 percent of the 74 added programs required matching of federal funds by the grant recipients, as against 36 percent of the 39 discontinued programs.

As would be expected, changes in the breakdown of grants by department or agency reflect the changing functional mix (Table 6). The Public Health Service, the Department of Housing and Urban Development, and the Department of Education had the greatest increases in the number of grant programs between FY 1991 and 1993. The Public Health Service and Education were also the leading growth centers from 1987 to 1989 and from 1989 to 1091.

As usual, most of the new programs added from FY 1991 to FY 1993 were relatively small in terms of funding.' The median (middle item) of estimated obligations for FY 1993 was \$5.4 million. The mean (average) was \$26.4 million.

lion, showing the effect of a few larger budget programs, such as Home Investment in Affordable Housing, \$1 billion (CFDA 14.239); Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS, \$147.7 million (CFDA 14.241); and HIV prevention Activities—Health Department Based, \$144 million (CFDA 93.940).

Over the years, there has been some shifting in the proportion of categorical grant programs directed to various types of recipients (Table 7). In the past two years, the percentages going to state governments exclusively and to state and local governments together declined slightly while the percentage of programs for which non-governmental organizations (public and private nonprofit) are eligible along with state and local governments rose from 49.0 percent to 50.5 percent. As shown in Table 7, the shift to the latter group has been the general trend since 1975.

The Federal Grant Picture and the Bush Administration

While grant outlays have been on a general upward trend since 1975, from FY 1989 to 1993—the Bush Years—there was a sharp upturn (see Table 2). In constant dollars, outlays went from \$101.2 billion in 1975 to \$166.3 billion in 1993 (estimated), an average rise of 9.2 percent per year. For 1989-1993, the average yearly increase jumped to 12.1 percent. compared to an average yearly increase of 1.0 percent for the five years 1984-1989, and 1.5 percent for 1981-1989.

Table 8 shows grant outlays to states and localities by function and subfunction for FY 1989, FY 1991, and FY 1993 (estimated). Most prominent is Medicaid, the federal-state program for financing medical services for the poor. From 28.3 percent of total outlays in 1989, Medicaid rose to 34.6 percent in 1991 and 39.1 percent in 1993 (estimated). In 1975, Medicaid represented only 14 percent of total grant outlays. (This steady expansion of Medicaid outlays is an important reason for the current drive to reform the national health care system.)

With Medicaid's overwhelming impact on the total grant picture, some functions diminished in relative importance while several others more than held their own in absolute dollar figures. As shown in Figure 5, income security expenditures rose by \$15.1 billion or 47 percent; education, training. employment and social services by \$12 billion or 54 percent: and transportation by \$7.3 billion or 29 percent. Although at lower funding levels, community and regional development went **up** \$2.8 billion, 69 percent. and agriculture dropped over \$200 million, about 17 percent.

In terms of the structure of the grant system, the number of categorical grants continued to grow, from 478 in 1989 to 578 for 1993. or 21 percent. Most of these grants were narrowly drawn and small in dollar terms. The formula-project breakdown followed the recent trend, with formula grants growing by 3 percent and project grants by 30 percent. A net of only one new block grant was added to the 14 existing in 1989. The slowness in consolidating categoricals into blocks was not for lack of interest by the administration. In his 1992 and 1993 budgets, President Bush proposed consolidating and turning over to the states grant programs totaling as much as \$20 billion, with the specifics to be determined by the Congress. the administration, and the governors. The administration proposed to replace these programs with a single consolidated block grant to the states. This proposal was not enacted.



Methodology

In counting grant-in-aid programs to state and local governments for this report, ACIR used a slightly modified version of the definition used by the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) in its instructions to executive agencies for preparing and submitting budget estimates (Circular A-11). Following is OMB's definition:

... grants to State and local governments are defined as outlays by the Federal Government in support of State or local programs of government operations or provision of services to the public. ...

Grants include:

- direct cash grants to State or local governmental units, to other public bodies established under State or local law, or to their designee;
- payments for grants-in-kind, such as purchases of commodities distributed to State or local governmental institutions (e.g., school lunch programs);
- payments to nongovernmental entities when such payments result in cash or in-kind services or products that are passed on to State or local governments (e.g., payments to the Corporation for Public Broadcasting or to the American Printing House for the Blind);
- payments to regional commissions and organizations that are redistributed at the State or local level to provide public services;
- federal payments to State and local governments for research and development that is an integral part of the State and local governments' provision of services to the general public (e.g, research on crime control financed from law enforcement assistance grants or on mental health associated with the provision of mental rehabilitation services—see discussion below for exclusions related to research and development and payments for services rendered);
- direct loan or loan guarantee subsidies to State or local governments; and
- shared revenues; these payments to State or local governments are computed as a percentage of the proceeds from the sale of certain Federal proper-

ty, products. or services (e.g., payments from receipts of Oregon and California grant lands) or arc tax collections by the Federal Government that are passed on to State or local governments (e.g., internal revenue collections for Puerto Rico).

Excluded under this definition are:

- Federal administrative expenses associated with these programs;
- grants directly to profit-making institutions. individuals, and nonprofit institutions not covered above (e.g., payments to Job Corps centers and trainees):
- payments for research and development not directly related to the provision of services to the general public (e.g., basic research);
- payments for services rendered (e.g., utility services, training programs and expenses for Federal employees, research and development for Federal purposes conducted under contracts. grants. or agreements by such agencies as the National Institutes of Health, the National Science Foundation, the Department of Energy, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, and the Department of Defense); and
- Federal grants to cover administrative expenses for regional bodies and other funds not redistributed to the States, or their subordinate jurisdictions (e.g., the administrative expenses of the Appalachian Regional Commission).'

The OMB definition is used in this report with the following exceptions: shared revenues and loan subsidies have been excluded, and programs of aid to institutions of higher education have been included only if the aid is exclusively to public institutions of higher education or it State or local governments have a role in the process.

Funded programs meeting these criteria were identified in the 1993 Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance (OMB-GSA, June 1993), which is a "government-wide

compendium of federal programs, projects, services, and activities which provide assistance or benefits to the American public." Programs appearing in the catalog in 1993 and not in 1991 were checked against their legislative authorization (or executive order) to make certain that each such new program conformed to the rule followed in this **ACIK**

scries, that is, that each separately counted program must have a separate legislative authorization. The source for the legislative authorization was the *United States Code*, 1988 Edition, Supplement II, 1990, and United States Code. Congressional and Administrative News. 103rd Congress, 1993.

Data Included

This report lists the block and categorical grant programs funded on January 1, 1993. The programs are listed by budget subfunction number and within that by the corresponding number assigned in the *Catalog* of *Federal Domestic Assistance*. The following information is shown for each program:

- 1. Budget subfunction classification and title;
- 2. U.S. Code or Public Law reference;
- 3. Grant type (method of distribution);
- 4. Formula data elements, where applicable;
- 5. Eligible grant recipients;
- **6.** Maximum federal share:
- 7. Administering agency; and
- 8. Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance number.

The following brief descriptions of these terms may help the reader in using the report.

Budget Subfunction—These are the subfunctional categories and numbers that appear in the 1993 catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance, Appendix III. For example, Budget Function 500 is Education, Training, Employment, and Social Services; Subfunction 501 is Elementary, Secondary, and Vocational Education.

Grant Type—Formula grants determine each eligible recipient's allotment by formula. Project grants require competitive applications. In some cases, competition for project grant funds is constrained by a formula that may, for instance, determine how much money applicants within each state may receive. These grants are termed formula/project grants. Seventeen of the 161 formula-based grant entries are marked with an asterisk to indicate their open-end character.

Formula **Data** Elements — These are the 13 major categories of statistical series used in formula grants as identified

by the U.S. General Accounting Office in *Grants Formulas:* A Catalog of Federal Aids to States and Localities (Washington, DC, 1987, GAO/HRD-87-28). The report is as of fiscal year 1984. ACIR has applied the GAO classification to formula grant programs added between FY 1984 and FY 1993.

Federal Share—The numbers listed in this column indicate the maximum percentage of program costs to he paid by federal funds. The number 100 indicates a grant with no matching requirements. It does not mean the federal grant actually covers 100 percent of the cost of the aided program or activity; it means the recipient is not required to match any portion of the federal grant. The "cost shared" (CS) category includes all those grants where some recipient contribution is required, but the exact amount is not specified. In such cases, the match may be the subject of negotiation, or may be set by the appropriate agency head. Other symbols are used to indicate when a matching ratio is variable For different recipients, changes over time. or is different for different activities or types of recipients.

Agency—This column indicates the responsible administering agencyfor eachgrant. Except for the Department of Health and Human Services, subdepartmental units are not indicated.

CFDA Number—This is the number assigned the program in the 1993 *Catalog* of *Federal Domestic Assistance*. For example, CFDA numbers for Budget Subfunction 501. Elementary, Secondary, and Vocational Education, include a new program 84.249— Foreign Languages Assistance.

The key on page 21 lists and explains the full range of entries for type of grant, formula data elements, recipient, federal share, and administering agency.

Formula Data Elements

- A. Population includes series such as total population, population by age, race, density, urban, rural, farm, handicapped, immigrant, and in poverty.
- **B.** Income includes per capita income, median family income, aggregate personal income, and wages earned or paid.
- C. Environment includes land area, land use, environmental conditions, environmental hazardous waste data, size of water systems, volume of oil and gas production, and miles of coastline.
- **D.** Education includes enrollment, graduates, and educational expenditures.
- E. Labor includes civilian labor force, unemployment levels, and employment statistics.
- Transportation includes series, such as miles of highways and rail, aviation facilities, number of vehicles, and number of miles traveled.
- G. Energy—includes energy consumption, heating and cooling degree days, levels of energy conservation, fuel costs, and residential heating/cooling equipment.
- H. Government-includes taxation, expenditures, government employment, and salary levels.
- Health includes illness data, vital statistics, and levels of health-related expenditures.
- Price Indices includes consumer prices.
- **K.** Housing—includes number of units, condition of units, vacancy rates, and age of housing stock.
- L. Economic Sectors includes business activity. manufacturing, retail trade, and agricultural statistics.
- M. hliscellaneous Measures of Program Costs/Activity Levels — includes series, such as number of meals or number of pints of milk served, other income received by an agency, estimated costs to complete a project, the number of eligible recipients, and prior-year program expenditures.
