

A Catalog of Federal Grant-In-Aid Programs to State and Local Governments: Grants Funded FY 1984



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Preface

A significant portion of the research for the Commission's 14-volume series, *The Intergovernmental Grant System: An Assessment and Proposed Policies*, published in 1977-78, consisted of identifying and counting federal grant programs as of January 1, 1975. The results were published by ACIR in *A Catalog of Federal Grant-in-Aid Programs to State and Local Governments: Grants Funded FY 1975 (A-52a)*, and were updated at three-year intervals in reports A-72 (1978) and M-133 (1981).

This volume is the third updating of the original inventory, covering Congressional action from January 1, 1981, through December 31, 1983. It provides a snapshot of the scope and principal features of federal grant programs at the end of the first three years of the Reagan Administration, and comments on major trends in categorical and block grants during those years.

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Federal Grant-in-Aid Programs to State and Local Governments: Grants Funded FY 1984

The number of federal categorical grant-in-aid programs available to state and local governments stood at 392 as of January 1, 1984, according to a tally made by the ACIR staff. This represents a decrease of 142, or about 27%, from the 534 counted three years earlier. It is the first time the number has declined since ACIR's first count in 1975. The comparable figures in ACIR's triennial inventories are: 1975—442, 1978—492, 1981—534, and 1984—392.

Major reasons for the decrease are the deletion of grant programs because of reduced funding and the consolidation of 77 programs by the enactment of nine new or revised block grants by Congress in the *Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1981*. In subsequent block grant action, Congress replaced one block grant (Title II, Parts B and C, of the *Comprehensive Employment and Training Act—CETA*) with another (Title IIA of the *Job Training Partnership Act—JTPA*) and added a new one (Urban Mass Transportation Capital and Operating Assistance). The JTPA legislation also created six new categoricals in lieu of the 15 that existed under the CETA program. Overall, the number of block grants increased from four in FY 1981 to 12 in FY 1984. The aggregate of categorical and block grant programs, then, declined from 538 in 1981 to 404 in 1984. General Revenue Sharing rounded out the array of federal financial assistance programs available to state and local governments.¹

392 Categoricals

The 392 categorical grants funded as of January 1, 1984, and their major features, are identified in the body of this catalog—an update of ACIR's 1975, 1978, and 1981 volumes.² Although the categoricals are the focus of the following analysis, they are preceded in the listing by the General Revenue Sharing program and the 12 block grants funded as of the beginning of 1984.

Categorical grants are directed at specific, narrowly defined activities, and are distributed either according to a legislatively or administratively prescribed formula (formula grants) or at the discretion of the administrator (project grants). Block grants, in contrast, are distributed in accordance with statutory formulae for use in a variety of activities within a broad functional area largely at the recipient's discretion. There are, of course, no functional restrictions on use of General Revenue Sharing funds.

Table 1 shows the breakdown among the four major types of categorical grant programs at the time of the ACIR's four catalogs. The four types are described in the later section on "Data Included."

The decline in the overall number of categorical grants was shared proportionally between formula and project grants as they retained roughly their one-third (formula) and two-thirds (project)

shares from 1981 to 1984. Within the formula group, the number of formula-project grants declined relatively more than the other two types, indicating that Congress was tending away from trying to assure that project grants are allocated among the states on a predetermined basis.

As already noted, a substantial portion of the decrease in the number of funded categorical grants is traceable to the consolidation of programs by block grants enacted in 1981. The single education and four health block grants absorbed the largest number of categoricals—37 and 27, respectively. The remainder of the net reduction in categoricals is due to the failure to provide funding for authorized programs. Relatively few were dropped because authorizing legislation expired or was repealed. As is well known, the number of authorized grant programs far exceeds those that are actually funded.

The Changing Functional Mix

Comparing categorical grants in 1981 and 1984 by function (Table 2) highlights first of all the effects of the major new block grants, as evidenced by the large decrease in the number of education, training and employment, and health grants. Other changes mirror shifting currents of federal policy over the three-year period. Significant numbers of programs were terminated in

such areas as energy conservation and regulation (seven programs), pollution control and abatement (8), care for migrants and refugees (five programs, appearing in various functional classes), area and regional development (6), and health maintenance organizations (3).

The functional emphasis among the 40-some new programs was more widely dispersed, with some moderate clustering of programs in transportation (paratransit and mass transit related) and programs concerned with the handicapped (for example, Removal of Architectural Barriers, and Secondary Education and Transitional Services for Handicapped Youth).

One other generalization may be made about the trend in the mix of categorical grants over the three-year period: there was a pronounced reduction in the number of programs designed to build the capacity of state and local governments. These terminations encompassed about a dozen programs keyed to upgrading management, personnel training, and planning, in addition to the two assistance programs under the *Intergovernmental Personnel Act*. Included were such grants as: Quiet Communities—State and Local Capacity Building Assistance, Water Pollution Control: State and Local Manpower Program Development, Solid Waste Management Training, Alcohol Clinical or Service Related Training Programs, and Emergency Medical Services: Training. Some observers wondered whether this reduced emphasis on capacity-building programs was consistent with devolving more responsibility to state and local government. Others held that it was a natural concomitant of devolution.

Other Trends in Categorical Programs

The three-year period witnessed a reversal in the trend of nonfederal matching. The proportion of categorical grants requiring matching declined from 61.5% in 1975 to 57.1% in 1978 to 53.4% in 1981. For 1984 the figure rose to 55.4% (*Table 3*). The change is mainly traceable to the education, employment and training, and health block grants. The bulk of the categorical grants consolidated by those blocks required no state or local match.

The pattern of aid recipients changed slightly from 1981 to 1984. The share of categorical grants going exclusively to local governments dropped from 4.3% to 3.6%, largely, again, because of the education block grant, which consolidated many categorical grants targeted at local school districts. Grants

for which both state and local governments are eligible also declined, from 13.0% to 10.7%. The major increase was registered by grants directed exclusively to states: up from 36.3% to 38.8% of total categorical grants. This change reflects the fact that the net reduction in this latter group was less proportionally than that of categorical grants going exclusively to local governments or to state and local governments combined. The share going to "states, local governments, and nonprofit organizations" was essentially unchanged.

The effect of blocking education, health, and labor grants also shows up in looking at the changes by major grant-administering department or agency (*Table 4*). The Department of Education, HHS's Public Health Service, and the Department of Labor stand out, with net reductions of 43, 44, and nine categorical grants, respectively. Commerce's drop of nine programs mainly reflects termination of several economic development and coastal energy impact programs, and EPA's reduction of eight chiefly involves discontinuation of a number of water pollution control and solid waste management categorical grants.

12 Block Grants

Block grants now occupy a substantial place in the national government's repertory of financial assistance programs to states and localities. The 12 block programs are the most ever on the books, involve seven functional areas, are administered by five departments and four major subdivisions of one of these (Health and Human Services), and account for about 15% of FY 1984's estimated outlays for grants-in-aid. Nine of the 12 require no state or local matching, and all but two go to state governments. The two exceptions—Urban Mass Transit Capital and Operating Assistance and the Community Development Block Grant/Entitlements—are direct federal-local programs.

Since the quantum leap in the number of block grants in 1981, the Administration has submitted numerous additional block grant proposals, two of which materialized in the Job Training Partnership Act and the Mass Transit block grants. President Reagan's 1985 budget proposal calls for a science and mathematics education block grant and expanding the Primary Care one.

Not all movement is toward a continuing accretion of block grants, of course. Congress has responded slowly since 1981 to Administration proposals for more blocking.

Methodology

The methodology used in counting grant-in-aid programs was basically the same as that followed in compiling the first ACIR catalog for FY 1975. For ease of reference the explanation contained in the earlier volume is repeated here with appropriate changes.

ACIR used a slightly modified version of the definition of grants-in-aid used by the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) in its instructions (Circular No. A-11, Revised) to executive agencies for preparing and submitting budget estimates. Following is OMB's definition.

... Grants-in-aid ... are defined as budget outlays by the federal government in support of state or local programs of government operations or provision of services to the public. ...

Grants-in-aid include:

(a) Direct cash grants to state or local governmental units, to other public bodies established under state or local law, or to their designee (e.g., federal aid for highway construction).

(b) Payments for grants-in-kind, such as purchases of commodities distributed to state or local governmental institutions (e.g., school lunch programs).

(c) Payments to nongovernmental entities when such payments result in cash or in-kind services or products that are passed on to state or local governments (e.g., payments to the Corporation for Public Broadcasting or to the American Printing House for the Blind).

(d) Payments to regional commissions and organizations that are redistributed at the state or local level to provide public services.

(e) Federal payments to state and local governments for research and development that is an integral part of the state and local governments' provision of services to the general public (e.g., research on crime control financed from law enforcement assistance grants or on mental health associated with the provision of mental rehabilitation services). (See (i) and (j) below for exclusions related to research and development.)

(f) Shared revenues, a subcategory of grants. These payments to state or local governments are computed as a percentage of the proceeds from the sale of certain federal property, products, or services (e.g., payments from receipts of Oregon and California grant lands) or are tax collections by the federal government that are passed on to state or local governments (e.g., internal revenue collections for Puerto Rico).

Excluded under this definition are:

(g) Federal administrative expenses associated with these programs.

(h) Grants directly to profit-making institutions, individuals, and nonprofit institutions not covered above (e.g., payments to Job Corps Centers and trainees).

(i) Payments for research and development not directly related to the provision of services to the general public (e.g., basic research).

(j) Payments for services rendered (e.g., utility services, training programs and expenses for federal employees, research and development for federal purposes conducted under contracts, grants, or agreements by such agencies as the National Institutes of Health, the National Science Foundation, the Department of Energy, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, and the Department of Defense).

(k) Federal grants to cover administrative expenses for regional bodies and other funds not redistributed to the states, or their subordinate jurisdictions (e.g., the

administrative expenses of the Appalachian Regional Commission).¹

The OMB definition is used here with the following exceptions: shared revenues² and payments in lieu of taxes have been excluded, and programs of aid to institutions of higher education have been included only if the aid is exclusively to public institutions of higher education or if state or local governments have a role in the process.

Programs meeting these criteria were identified by a thorough search of the *United States Code, 1982 Edition*, and *United States Code, Congressional and Administrative News, 98th Congress, 1st Session*. Supplementary documents were used to determine if programs were operational, most particularly the *Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance*, prepared by the Office of Management and Budget, and *The Budget of the United States Government, 1985, Appendix*.

Since there are no accepted rules for determining when an authorized activity is a separate program, counting the number of grants is not a simple task. A single statute often authorizes a number of separate, albeit related programs. Other statutes combine activities which, because of funding, operation, or administration, are actually separate programs. Some programs are authorized as earmarked activities under an authorization for a broader activity, or several alternate activities may be listed as permissible under one program. Such program authorities were not disaggregated here for the purpose of counting unless supplementary sources indicated the desirability to do so.

After a preliminary inventory was made using the above procedure, listings were sent to the departments and agencies administering the grants for confirmation or correction. Replies were received from all 22 of the units canvassed. Their responses were checked against statutory references as necessary. Finally, the entire list was checked against the 1984 *Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance*, which was distributed in July 1984.

Data Included

The present ACIR catalog lists the block and categorical grant programs funded on January 1, 1984. The programs are listed by budget subfunction number and within that number by the corresponding number assigned by the OMB *Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance*. The following information is shown for each program:

- 1) budget subfunction classification and title,
- 2) U.S. Code reference,
- 3) grant type (method of distribution),
- 4) formula factors, where applicable,
- 5) eligible grant recipients,
- 6) maximum federal share,
- 7) administering agency, and
- 8) *Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance* number.

The following brief descriptions of these terms may help the reader in using the catalog.

Budget Subfunction—These are the subfunctional categories and numbers that appear in *The Budget of the United States Government, FY 1985, Part 8*.

Grant Type—Formula grants employ a formula to determine each eligible recipient's allotment. Project grants require competitive applications from aspiring recipients. In some cases, competition for project grant funds is constrained by a formula that may, for instance, determine how much money applicants within each state may

receive. These grants are termed formula-project grants. Eighteen of the 126 formula and formula-project grant entries are asterisked to indicate their open-end character. These cost-reimbursement grants do not use formulas as such to allocate a fixed amount of money, but rather commit the federal government to reimburse recipient cost at a specified rate.

Formula Factors—These are the kinds of data used to calculate a recipient's maximum allotment. Total population, population subgroups, program level, per capita personal income, and land area are separately identified. In addition, per capita income when used to modify some other formula factor is shown. Provisions for minimum or maximum allotments, as well as "hold-harmless" provisions are also indicated.

Federal Share—The numbers listed in this column indicate the maximum percentage of program costs to be paid by federal funds. The number "100" indicates a grant with no matching requirements. It does not mean the federal grant actually covers 100% of the cost of the aided pro-

gram or activity; it only means the recipient is not required to match any portion of the federal grant. The "cost-shared" (CS) category includes all those grants where some recipient contribution is required, but the exact amount is not specified. In such cases, the match may be the subject of negotiation, or may be set by the appropriate Secretary. Other symbols are used to indicate when a matching ratio is variable for different recipients, changes over time, or is different for different activities or types of recipients.

Agency—This column indicates the responsible administering agency for each grant. Except for the Department of Health and Human Services, subdepartmental units are not indicated.

CFDA No.—This is the number assigned the program in the 1984 *Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance*.

what is ACIR?

The Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations (ACIR) was created by the Congress in 1959 to monitor the operation of the American federal system and to recommend improvements. ACIR is a permanent national bipartisan body representing the executive and legislative branches of Federal, state, and local government and the public.

The Commission is composed of 26 members—nine representing the Federal government, 14 representing state and local government, and three representing the public. The President appoints 20—three private citizens and three Federal executive officials directly and four governors, three state legislators, four mayors, and three elected county officials from states nominated by the National Governors' Association, the National Conference of State Legislatures, the National League of Cities/U.S. Conference of Mayors, and the National Association of Counties. The three Senators are chosen by the President the Senate and the three Congressmen by the Speaker of the House.

Each Commission member serves a two year term and may be reappointed.

As a continuing body, the Commission approaches its work by addressing itself to specific issues and problems, the resolution of which would produce improved cooperation among the levels of government and more effective functioning of the federal system. In addition to dealing with the all important functional and structural relationships among the various governments, the Commission has also extensively studied critical stresses currently being placed on traditional governmental taxing practices. One of the long range efforts of the Commission has been to seek ways to improve Federal, state, and local governmental taxing practices and policies to achieve equitable allocation of resources, increased efficiency in collection and administration, and reduced compliance burdens upon the taxpayers.

Studies undertaken by the Commission have dealt with subjects as diverse as transportation and as specific as state taxation of out-of-state depositories; as wide ranging as substate regionalism to the more specialized issue of local revenue diversification. In selecting items for the work program, the Commission considers the relative importance and urgency of the problem, its manageability from the point of view of finances and staff available to ACIR and the extent to which the Commission can make a fruitful contribution toward the solution of the problem.

After selecting specific intergovernmental issues for investigation, ACIR follows a multistep procedure that assures review and comment by representatives of all points of view, all affected levels of government, technical experts, and interested groups. The Commission then debates each issue and formulates its policy position. Commission findings and recommendations are published and draft bills and executive orders developed to assist in implementing ACIR policies.
